ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: All right. So we've reviewed and approved the meeting minutes. Item 9 is reports, Council Member reports. Maybe we'll start with Atqasuk.

MS. KIPPI: Good morning, everybody. This is Wanda Kippi from Atqasuk, North Slope Subsistence Regional Advisory Council Member.

Our freeze up was a little different. It felt eery like there was -- can you hear me clearly? Yeah? Okay. Our freeze up was late as usual and I didn't get to go ice fishing like I normally do. Even last year's was a little late. For these past few years it's been a late freeze up and I didn't actually go ice fishing. I went back home middle of October and it's supposed to be frozen already. But after I went home it froze up maybe two, three days later and I didn't even bother to go back to camp because I was so upset. I waited for two weeks to go ice fishing at camp and it never froze thick enough to walk on the ice, so I went home.

But during the hunting season for the caribou, they had to go far. A lot of them went way far to go caribou hunting. There would be females and young around, but they weren't -- I didn't see a lot of them. They were towards Barrow area I think, a lot of them were. I saw some but not -- a lot of calves and females all over around.

And our geese hunting was good.

Our fishing -- fishing started late. People were fishing at -- near our village, about a mile up or down. They were fishing and the creeks were open still on some of the areas near town by the creek.

And I think there was -- it felt very eery at my cabin this year because I didn't see hardly any birds, hardly any foxes. There had to be something out there, some predator, because there was no caribou around. It didn't feel right while I was up there. The two weeks I was up there it felt very eery and too quiet, you know. Not even a bird. I finally saw a raven and a fox within those two weeks only once and I usually see them more. There was ptarmigan, there was

some ptarmigan coming and going, but the rest of the time I hardly saw them so I'm pretty sure there was a predator, but I didn't see any with my own eyes, but it felt like there was something out there.

There was a polar bear that was caught within our boundaries of our community on the other side ofthe air strip and it was afemale. And it was — it came all the way up from maybe the Barrow area or Wainwright area somewhere. Probably from the Barrow area. So we're 70 miles in. That's how many — that's one out of how many years a polar bear come up to our village. And that was put down and shared with the community.

 $$\operatorname{And}$$ I don't know, I think I'm pretty much done, Mr. Chair.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Thank you for your report, Wanda. That's very unusual for polar bears to be going that far inland, so that was definitely something to document.

 $$\operatorname{Let's}$ see. Steve. You have a report from Point Hope.

MR. OOMITTUK: So good afternoon. Good morning. This is Steve Oomittuk from Point Hope, North Slope Subsistence Advisory Council.

it's been a good year in some Yeah, ways. You know, the caribou, we had a late freeze up as usual, but we celebrated the form of the ice, and when it's clear, you know, we bring out the whale's tail and it seems to be getting later and later into late November. It usually happens in September, late September, you know. And usually snow falls in -before -- you know, in September and October. year, you know, we had -- it usually -- normally don't snow once -- it snows on Halloween day and this year it didn't snow on Halloween, and an abundance of -- you can tell when it's not stormy and you have a lot of Halloween trick-or-treaters, you know.

But, you know, the caribou stuck around even though the population had dropped down. Usually the Western Arctic Caribou Herd starts migrating south

in first part of July it comes through our community, and that's when we gather the eggs usually in July, the first of July the bird eggs at Cape Thompson and then at Cape Lisburne, but this year they were early. They were getting eggs in middle part of June, you know, which is probably much earlier.

You know, we've always lived a cycle of life where we do -- once you get eggs or what animals are coming, you know, it's been passed from generation to generation. We're very fortunate for the abundance of food that migrates through our area.

And, you know, the caribou, we had a lot of hunters, drop off planes, like circling caribous up north, up towards Kayak on the other side of -- by Kupuk River along the creek there that goes to the sea up ridge and further north, but they notice every time they go up they see planes like they're circling and trying to reroute the caribou that are supposed to be migrating south. And that's one of the concerns we had, that, you know, the old days the elders told us, you know, you let the first herd of caribou come through and the rest will, they'll follow. You know, it seemed like it's been changing. We're very fortunate....

 $$\operatorname{\textsc{Can}}$$ you still hear me? I hear something beeping.

 $\,$ ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Yeah, we can still hear you, Steve.

MR. OOMITTUK: Okay. Okay. I wasn't sure, you know. Okay. But, you know, we're very concerned on the division of the Western Arctic Caribou Herd down to about 140,000, you know, especially when it was at a high of close to 500,000. And, you know, the Federal Subsistence Board, you know, when it decreased our numbers of harvesting, and yet they still will allow out of state hunters and non-residents to come into our region and hunt for theirs, you know, and, you know, every year, the Northwest -- the Northwest Territory, I mean the Western Arctic Caribou Herd is one of the longest migration routes and a lot of people depend on that, especially the inland people that, you know, with their low income and high cost of living, high cost of transportation, it's a real burden for them to try to put food on the table when the

1 migration of the Western Arctic caribou herd doesn't make it through their communities. And you could see 2 that migration routes are changing. And, yet, we still 4 have to, you know, even though we're an advisory 5 council for the North Slope Borough and the Northwest 6 Arctic Council, you know, we always support each other, 7 but it seems like we get shut down by the Federal Subsistence Board when we put in proposals towards 8 9 them, and that's not right, you know. I think each 10 time that, you know, as tribal members, Council 11 members, you know , we have a government to government 12 relationship and that's our way of life and it's 13 changing and, you know, the high cost of living, and 14 it's something that subsistence has always been around, 15 and you know, it's trying to get the best of both worlds, but with the low economy and it's a struggle 16 17 for a lot of people. And, you know, if we keep arguing 18 and arguing about our food source, you know, we've 19 often been told when we can hunt, where we can hunt, 20 calmly, we can then, you know -- and whether they are Federal lands, public lands, Federal lands, and yet, 21 you know, they still allow all these out of state and 22 23 non-resident people in, and that's something -- you 24 know, that's the communities, you know, within the 25 region should be a priority. You know, they are going 26 to deplete our harvest of certain species, yet, you 27 know, they look at, you know, not allowing non-28 residents or out of state hunters to come into our 29 territory and, you know, hunt for their pleasure. You 30 know, the majority of the meat, you know, in fact we 31 use everything on the caribou, you know, I mean. And 32 yet, you know, you don't see very many people having any antlers hanging on their walls or anything like 33 34 So it's something that, you know, as far as the that. 35 people of the North and Northwest and, you know, within 36 Alaska and all over the State have always been there 37 because of the abundance of food that migrates to the 38 north, you know, and it's, you know, they fed us, they 39 clothed us, they sheltered us since time immemorial, and made us who we are. gave us as our identity as a 40 41 people and we see it slowly deteriorating. You know, I 42 mean it's something that our parents, our grandparents 43 fought for, you know, when they were trying to stop our 44 hunting, and the -- and, you know, one of the old 45 was, sayings, I can't remember what it 46 (Indiscernible) but, you know, when he did his speech 47 and he said, you know, hunger knows no law. You know, 48 when you're hunger, you know, you catch what's there 49 and available right then and now. We don't have such 50

 things, you know, the caribou go down and migrate on certain lands or hungry and when we see them, but, you know, our younger generation, you know, our elders, you know, worked very hard to put food on the table and, you know, the old saying of hunger knows no law when it started becoming when we were overrun by the State. I think it's time that we -- you know, we're going to make our own subsistence ways, you know, because we're concerned about the animals, too.

And I wish I was there in person to be at these workshops and to speak out, too, also, but I thank you guys. I've been listening and hopefully this will open a lot of eyes to a lot of the people out there, especially to the Federal Subsistence Board and how we get overrun by them in our own region when a majority of them don't even live within our areas or see our lifestyles or the hardships that are there, because subsistence is very vital to our communities.

Thank you. That's all I had.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Thank you, Mr. Oomittuk. Very knowledgeable of your location there, a lot of good recommendations and discussions to be had on these items, so thank you for your report. It's very good to hear your conversations and enjoy the discussion.

MR. OOMITTUK: Thank you. Taikuu.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: All right. Next on the list we have AKP, Peter Williams.

MR. WILLIAMS: Good morning. Peter Williams for RAC from Anaktuvuk Pass. We had some caribous coming in this fall. Everybody got lucky and these young guns we call them, they've been going out with the young boys and teaching them, you know, the ropes, well, my ways, we always leave some gas around because young kids always want to go out hunting and they don't have nowhere to turn to. Like I said before, you know, we've got to teach our young kids how to step up to the plate, because, you know, we're not going to be here for them to be of -- surviving them.

We did pretty good this year on caribou and those kids were happy. Even at the school they brought up -- you know, the teacher, you know, about

giving them a couple days off if they want to go hunting and that sounds pretty good, and that turned out pretty good. They went out, studied caribou, about how they migrate and the elders telling them where they go and they don't always come through Anaktuvuk like they always used to. Used to be 100 -- 2, 300,000 come through there about five, six years ago, and now we just -- we're finally coming back up and lately we've been hunting at Nuiqsut and we're really happy about that because, you know, we had no meat source.

We had plentiful of berries. A lot of ptarmigans come back and rabbits are popping up again. I don't know, if that's the eight-year cycle, but there's a lot but people don't eat rabbits up there, so there's a lot of rabbits popping around.

And, waterfowl, a lot of us go up into the mountains to go hunting but this year they said that it was kind of -- they showed up much like it used

And a lot of caribous went toward Coldfoot, but they stayed around up there on (Indiscernible) like they can't cross the river, like Brower said, you know, on the ice, when the ice gets thin, you know, they don't wander around, they just stay because, you know, I don't want to step on the ice, too, because it gets it gets slippery and cracks, you know. And elders spoke up about those, about how caribous act, they know about the weather, time of change of weather, and it's just like they sense it. Sometimes they go up to the mountains, because, you know, they got nowhere to go.

They said there was some Porcupine Herd coming through but they stop above Venetie below Arctic Village. We keep contact with them people there about caribou migration and how they route. And lately they haven't come through that Dalton Highway side, you know. I don't know, there's a lot of sportshunters on the road too so, you know, you got to be aware because—we keep close touch with Jack Reakoff too so there's another good reason why -- we depend on caribou to be survival.

We're the only people from Anaktuvuk that speak up for caribou because they're caribou people, and we're trying to step up to it. The last 20

years we've been trying to step to say to explain to them that we need some kind of commission or a committee to run -- but every time I turn around and ask they say I've got to write a letter. We asked the village to write a letter, or ask the village to ask a letter, and does this get back to the table, I don't know what the Federal Subsistence Board is on, but, you know, we need to get their attention. I'm glad this meeting that we're having with the whole Alaska people, that we stand up and that's the only way we'll get more power and work together.

Thank you.

Brower Frantz from Utqiavik, North Slope Regional Advisory Council. We've had a really good year in Barrow for caribou. Caribou are walking through town right now as we speak just occupying the space. They're in town, around town, walking around on the ocean ice too. Thousands of them, so we're having a pretty good caribou year. So they're sticking around and have been for the last few months at least. everybody's getting their fill of caribou, but you can tell it's kind of few and far between that when they're around like that, everybody seems to not go crazy on hunting them. You see a few being taken, but not what They're actually -- they look like you would think.

they got used to the traffic and they're not running away so it gives you the sense that everybody's really respecting the movement, the migration pattern that they're taking right now and enjoying them while they're around. So caribou has been good. I didn't see any real issues with them, sickness-wise. They did look like a healthy population for what was around.

Whaling was a really good season this year. It was a year of very successful hunt for Barrow area, and they were younger whales which was a good sign for the reproduction side of it. It was a year of medium to small size whales and they seemed pretty And everybody loves the smaller whales healthy. because they're not so tough. The muktuk is easier for them to eat, especially for the older folks. larger the whale, the tougher, the muktuk is. It gets really tough to eat. So when they get a year of small whales like that it really helps the community to have like a better vibe to it because of the condition of the muktuk. It's very -- it's like having a buttery -they call them butterball whales, they're very easy to eat, lots of oil content and more rich. But they tell you to eat less of that kind because it's -- the oil content is pretty rich.

They had a good walrus season. That's the first year, I didn't get a walrus in a couple years, so walrus season was pretty good. So was the bearded seal season. We didn't seem to have near as many sick bearded seal as in previous years, so -- at least none that I noticed so the seal season was good.

Tons of snow geese for the spring time. You can tell the higher population has hit and snow geese are abundant which is -- we used to try to go for them because they were a little different now they're all over the place so -- so are the geese. The geese population seemed good for the white-fronted goose.

Eiders were plentiful. We didn't see any issues with any of the migrating eider ducks, any of their species. Actually there was an increase in Stellar and spectacled eider sightings around Barrow so that was really good sign for the endangered or the -- I'm not sure what the listing is right now on them. But they were more abundant than in previous years, so that was a really good sign. And they weren't -- they were next to the roads and generally they were --

according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services that they were having issues during nesting. It didn't seem to be the case, at least for this year, so it seemed pretty good on that side, so hopefully we start seeing more of those species.

Shorebirds, we did notice that a lot of shorebirds have been on the rise. Over the last 10 years or so there has been a lack of the smaller birds like the red farolops and it wasn't a big deal or anything. We don't hunt them, but back when I was younger there was hundreds of thousands of them flocking around during the falltime, flying around and over the last 10 years there was barely any which was kind of an odd thing. We noticed that it wasn't like that anymore, but over the last year the smaller shorebirds have made a comeback and it seems like they're starting to get more abundant like we used to see when we were small. So that was just something that I've noticed.

Moose has been good. We went way south and we ended up finding some moose in the willows, so it seemed like there was a good population at least in the valley of the willows to where we've been keeping track of for a while. So there was more moose this last fall in that area than any other previous year that we had seen, so it was a good sign for moose at least in the southern portion of the North Slope.

Let's see. I believe that should be about it for me. We haven't had any issues with fish. Fish has been good.

Yeah, the only other thing I haven't talked about is maybe squirrels, but we -- that's okay.

That's it for my report, so up next on the agenda we have action items. Anybody want to go through these action items.

MS. CHAPA: Mr. Chair. This is Gisela Chapa. And I just wanted to point out that the first action item, WP24-28/29 has already been addressed during the four-Counsel meeting held yesterday morning. There was only one action item left over from that meeting which was selecting one RAC member from this Council to be part of a working group to draft a letter in regards to the issue of non-resident hunters on

    submitted by the Western Interior Alaska Subsistence

    Regional Advisory Council. You can find a copy of this
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analysis starting on Page 89 of your meeting books.

The request of this proposal is to extend the closure to Dall sheep hunting in Units 24A and 26B west of the Sagavairktok River for the 2024 to 2026 regulatory cycle. This will be a two-year continuation of the closure that was initiated with WSA22-02.

The Western Arctic Council -- excuse 11 me, the Western Interior Council -- sir?

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Which page again?

MR. UBELAKER: 89 of your meeting books.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Okay.

MR. UBELAKER: Okay. The Western Interior Council feels that the sheep population is still experiencing the hardships that were put into place in the winter of 2013/2014 which has led to greatly reduced numbers. There are very few breeding rams remaining in the population, and they feel that continuing this closure will contribute to the overall breeding success of the population that is left, and the diminished population cannot support any harvest, period.

Recent regulatory history. In 2012 the Board allowed the harvest of half-curl or bigger rams in Unit 24A. Then in 2014 outside of the Gates of the Arctic National Park in 24A they changed that harvest limit from a 7/8th curl to one ram. There was little expected impact on abundance because the population appeared stable and the Federal harvest was minimal at the time.

Moving into 2015 in adjacent units, Units 23 and 26A, the Board of Game closed all sheep hunting because of drastic declines of sheep numbers. And since then all sheep seasons in Unit 23 have remained closed under State regulations.

 In 2020 the Board of Game extended the State season within the Dalton Highway corridor management area by 15 days. They approved this extension because low numbers of sheep harvest were expected and they believed that fewer hunters would

access this area that late in the season. In combination with the stable population they felt that it was a good move.

And then most recently in 2022 which you all just saw two years ago, the Board approved Special Action Request WSA22-02 which closed all sheep hunting on all Federal lands to all users for the '22 and '23 cycle -- seasons, excuse me. The Board considered local residential knowledge in combination with biological data to come to their conclusion to close this season.

Most recently on the biological side --well, I'll back up a little. I believe you guys saw all this data two years ago when this closure was initiated. Not much has changed, so I'm going to briefly touch on new updates. If anybody has any questions at any time or wants me to go into more detail, please let me know.

Fish and Game count, they survey the 1A/1B area, in kind of southern 24A, 25B. In 2021 they counted 469 total sheep. The last count they had increased, they counted 598 in 2022. Legal rams that they counted did, however decrease. 2021 they counted 12. On their last survey they counted 10.

In the same survey area, the 1A/1B, BLM surveys it. They use different methodology, so they came up with an estimate rather than a minimum count. In 2021 they counted 298 sheep, and then the recent count in 2022 went up to 573. Full curl rams also increased. They counted five -- excuse me, estimated five in 2021. In 2022 they estimated 10. Then in their full survey area, which encompasses the 1A/1B survey area -- this is going to get confusing and I apologize. If there are any questions, stop me at any time. Their full survey area which includes the 1A/1B, but also more of the Dalton Highway corridor area, their surveys showed in 2015 3,241. Then it decreased in 2021 to just over 1200 sheep. But then the last count in 2022 increased to 1,648.

Park Service utilizes the same methodology to come up with an estimate. In their southeast Gates of the Arctic unit, which is west of the Dalton Highway corridor in Unit 24A, in 2015 they counted 2,525 total sheep. Then in 2021 it dropped

drastically to 1100 sheep. And then in 2022 continued to decline to 709 estimated sheep. In the Park Service Itkillik survey area, which is just north of the southeast Gates of the Arctic, west of the Dalton Highway corridor, they counted -- they estimated 504 in 2021 and then which dropped in 2022 to 438 sheep.

Trying to boil this down into something a little more easier to digest, the legal ram numbers, the BLM full survey area went from 59 in 2015 to 12 in 2021 and then increased last year to 41 legal rams. Southeast Gates of the Arctic went from 137, dropped to 47 in 2021 and then continued to decline last year to 28 was their estimate.

So harvest of sheep in this area, there are three Federal registration permits that have been active from 2017 to 2021. All have very low harvest. Last year there was no reported harvest because the season was closed. State averages 52 people per year harvesting about 17 sheep out of 24A. In 26B they averaged 66 people harvesting 18 sheep. Non-resident harvest on the State side is believed to average 43 percent of total harvest reported on the State side from 2002 to 2021. However, resident hunters and harvest has declined since 2013 while non-resident numbers have remained constant since the decline.

OSM considered one other alternative to this proposal which would be to close the area to only non-Federally qualified users under the assumption that Federal harvesters only take about five percent of the sheep that are harvested out of the area. Because harvest pressure is low, their impact on the sheep population would be negligible. However, this was not considered further because the sheep population had declined so drastically and the harvestable sheep number had declined that any harvest or disturbance to the sheep may have hampered the recovery.

 So, if adopted, this would continue keeping all Federal lands closed to all users for regulatory years 2024 and 2025. This would give no opportunity for anybody to harvest sheep in that area on Federal lands. State regulations would still be in effect on all State and private lands and people could harvest sheep there.

Substantial conservation concerns

couple people around Finn Creek area, but they said they were just out hiking. And what they're doing way up there on the mountain then, you know. That's what they were asking those couple people, but we're having much problem with that -- that aircraft.

I'm glad that our Advisory Council and the North Slope Borough stepped up to the plate on this aircraft problems. The last 20 years we've been fighting them. We finally got them out of Anaktuvuk by using a stop over, say, need to leave meat and stuff at the airport for people in the village, but that meat sits in plastic bags for three days and it gets kind of smelly, so they don't use that. So we've got to be aware about aircrafts coming around. We report it all every time we see one, so we're aware of that. And I just want to thank you to the Chair and the Advisory Council for supporting us.

And you can work with your Council Coordinator if there's a proposal you want to submit, and we'll get it drafted, and then when the window opens, we'll submit it.

So that is all I had to present to you. I just am asking the Council if there's a proposal that they are interested in submitting to the call when it's open.

So for the regulatory bullet we just let the RAC know that the call for regulatory proposals will be coming soon, and we asked the RAC if there was anything they wanted to submit together as a group. You can also submit individual proposals when the call is open.

And then I asked for volunteers to help establish what priority -- what are the priority research needs in the Arctic. We are going to be doing a call for fisheries research and monitoring proposals next year, and so we want local input as to where we should direct that call and what data gaps exist. So if you'd like to volunteer, that would be fabulous.

MR. ADAMS: Okay. Have you had any meetings or discussions with any of the coastal villages?

MS. HYER: For what the priority research should be?

MR. ADAMS: Yes.

MS. HYER: No, we've not had any discussions yet. We are just asking for volunteers to help us begin the discussion. We have a draft list that went forward for the last call and we'll start there. And for that list we had talked to some of the coastal villages, but we're interested in any volunteers that will help us moving forward.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: So just to jump in here. Just was -- I thought it was a good idea to have -- he's actually the person I was talking about. He works directly with the Wildlife Department, so he's a good resource for getting you connected with their biologist that deals with the fish mold directly from Nuiqsut, and that would be Todd Sformo.

MR. ADAMS: Todd Sformo.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Yep. So he's been dealing directly with the fish mold and getting the

specimens transported back and forth to the lab facilities. So they would be a great resource. I just was throwing that out there maybe if he would bite the hook there, Quincy. Now at least he's.....

And the error in the book stated that our Council had 13 seats instead of 10, so if you go to the manilla envelope, you will find this document. And I'll have a brief script to read for you regarding your charter.

 MS. CHAPA: Okay. All 10 Subsistence Regional Advisory Councils were chartered under the Federal Advisory Committee Act. Under the Act each Council charter needs to be renewed every two years. So approximately a year before it is renewed, each Council can have a discussion to see if there's anything you want to change.

Your Council, as well as other Councils, reviewed the charter last year. Your Council's proposed the following modification, and I believe your charter reads now the Council is composed of 10 representative members and one non-voting young leader member.

And I can go ahead and read the rest of the charter if desired.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Okay. Was that just in the approval of the -- was it the addition of the young leader and the rest is the same as it was?

MS. CHAPA: Yeah.

ACTING CHAIR FRANTZ: Okay. Go ahead.

MS. CHAPA: Okay. I'll go ahead and read it. So the Federal Subsistence Board reviewed the Council's request for charter changes during its August 2023 work session and recommended to add all Council charters language on a designation of one non-voting young leader seat. The Secretaries of the Interior and Agriculture approved the Board's recommendation and modified the language in the first paragraph of the Section 12, membership and designation to the following as I'd already stated.

The Council is composed of 10 representative members and one non-voting young leader member. All representative members must be residents of the region represented by the Council and must be knowledgeable and experienced in matters relating to subsistence uses of fish and wildlife. In addition to being a resident of the region represented by the Council, the one non-voting young leader member must be between the age of 18 and 25 and must participate in subsistence activities, be otherwise knowledgeable in

A lot of people say 13 14 that I'm just like a role model, but I don't use that 15 example, I'm just trying to help our people, because, 16 you know, sooner or later we've got things that are 17 going to be opposite from us that are going to change 18 our values. So I just wanted to say thank you to the 19 agency that gave us a positive note on Anaktuvuk people 20 that really spoke for their caribou.
