Mr. Chair, I'll hand it over to you.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, DeAnna. Good morning everybody. I want to thank Cathy for taking over yesterday and leading us through with a very tricky part of the process there, developing proposals and commenting on proposals. I appreciate her taking the reigns there, she did a really good job, better than I would have done I'm sure.

So for the remainder of the meeting today DeAnna has sent out an email that kind of details what we have to finish up. It arrived a short time ago so if you have emails opened you can look at it. But I'll say what we need to do.

We need to finalize our wildlife proposals; that's an action item.

We need to review the Council charter, also an action item. And I would encourage the Council members to look at our charter. It's in the Council book. We do have some suggested improvements to the charter so take a close look at that.

We want to review the annual report. That's also a draft of what we've put together so far and is also in the Council book. I encourage the Council members to take a look at that before we get to that item.

We have an update on the Fisheries Resource Management projects.

 $$\operatorname{\textsc{We}}$$  have to confirm our dates and locations for future meetings.

And we'll have agency reports. And under the agency reports, those are generally short, 15 minute reports, but we have added under Native agencies a report from the Womens Earth and Climate Action Network, and I'm anticipating that being a lengthy

discussion. I hope to allow significant amount of time this afternoon to hear what they have to say and discuss some pretty interesting developments that may, you know, come before the Council here in the ensuing years so I think I want to devote some time to that.

And then before we close out the meeting we'll have to consider some correspondence that we've decided to write. We want to respond to the Sitka Kaagwaantaan's petition for extra-territorial jurisdiction. And make some comment on the petition for the Homelands Conservation. And we may also be talking about establishing a couple work groups on Forest Management and Homelands Conservation Rule proposal.

So still a busy day. But as always we start the morning with public comments on non-agenda items and I know we just heard from Heather Bauscher there in Sitka, she has something to say to us, and if there's anybody else that's come on the line in the interim that wants to give public comment this would be the time. But we will start with Heather Bauscher.

MS. BAUSCHER: Good morning, thank you, Mr. Chair. And thank you Southeast Regional Advisory Council. Happy to be here again before you. I'm actually before you today representing the Sitka AC. I'm now the Chair of our local AC and there's a couple of documents and developments I wanted to share with you.

Also I wanted to say thank you for the invitation for us to be part of this and I look forward to greater collaboration and communication between our AC and the RAC. Things that I've noticed that have come up, and that are also things that we've been discussing with the ACs, I'm always amused at hearing similar conversations and hearing what issues are similar in different communities across the region.

In the past couple months we've taken some action related to Roadless and related to climate and both of those things have come up again during this meeting and so I wanted to forward and share with you a letter that we drafted following up with the Roadless process similarly to your group. We had a hard time convening our committee in that last little window that they gave us so we ended up finishing drafting a letter

with our response and concern over the process but only ended up finalizing that after the holidays because the timeline changed. So I wanted to share that with you to help reinforce some of our positions on the issue and maybe ask for help in amplifying that up the chain.

And then the other document I have to share with you, and I'll make sure all of these get emailed to DeAnna, we, in response to AFN's climate emergency. Some youths from Edgecumbe came over to our meeting and we collectively passed a climate emergency resolution and asked for action to be taken to address these issues because of the impacts they're having to our resources. And so I wanted to share that with you. And we also drafted a letter that's going to be sent out to all the other ACs across the state encouraging similar action.

So I know you all talk about climate change a lot and I remember the last time we had a meeting in Sitka that was a big topic of discussion. I'm not sure if you're taking any action on that front but happy to show you what we've done and help amplify whatever regional work is being done.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Not hearing any Heather but we'll look forward to seeing those documents that you referred to there. And just a quick question, do you still have your classes going on government interactions -- I can't remember exactly what it's called but the students that have come to our meetings, are those classes still going on?

MS. BAUSCHER: They are paused at the moment. I'll switch hats. I'm not the Chair of the AC anymore, now I'm the community organizer for the Sitka Conservation Society. We have a wonderful agreement that was worked out right before Covid got crazy with the Forest Service, so much gratitude to the Forest Service for coming through and helping us with funding for that program. There's funding for three years but

we weren't able to hold the program the past year because of Covid and the policies and procedures course is -- for those who don't know, a dual enrollment course through UAS with partnership where we take high school students and explain the Federal Subsistence Board process and take them to the meetings but so much of the class is really focused around the experience learning component of experiencing the meetings and I was having a really hard time finding a way to make it work for high school students to not have to sit on the phone for three days. So hopefully this fall, if we can have the meetings in person, I'm hoping to bring a group of students to the next in person meeting that we have, whenever that is, and so far we're good holding on to the funding at the moment as far as I understand.

So that is pending and will be brought back as soon as possible.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Yeah, it's understandable why it hasn't happened the last couple of meetings. But actually we did have one student at the last meeting. But we do look forward to meeting in person in the fall and, yeah, we hope you can be there with some more students, it's a great program.

Thank you.

MS. BAUSCHER: Thank you so very much, and thanks for your support over the years on the program. And I look forward to being back there with you in person and bringing more young people to the process.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah. Anybody else on the Council, any other questions.

DOUVILLE: I do appreciate him 24 calling in and taking the time, you know, subsistence 25 is really important, culture-wise also. And we do 26 listen and, you know, we can only work via proposals or 27 stuff like that but, you know, if there's something like that in the works but it does take some effort to 28 29 do what Mr. Frank was doing, calling in and he's making 30 his voice heard and I appreciate it. 31 32 Thank you. 33 34 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yes, thank you, 35 Mike. Anybody else on the Council. 36 37 MR. WRIGHT: Mr. Chairman. 38 39 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Frank. 40 41 MR. WRIGHT: Yeah, I appreciate his 42 call too, you know. I know Angoon has a hard time 43 because of the ferry system and then even in Hoonah to 44 get on the ferry you have to stay in Juneau for a few 45 days before you're able to get your vehicle back. But 46 I think if proposals are put forward, I'm sure our 47 Staff would be able to help put a proposal together on 48 the crab issue or the deer hunting issues or anything 49 that the community of Angoon depends on. And I

0379 appreciate the call. 2 3 Thank you. 4 5 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Frank. 6 Anybody else on the Council, a question or a comment. 7 8 MR. HOWARD: Mr. Chairman, this is 9 Albert. 10 11 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, go ahead, 12 Albert. 13 14 MR. HOWARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 15 President Frank and I spend a lot of time out in Chatham. A lot of the locals, we have conversations 16 17 about what we see and one of the topics I had talked 18 about, and, again, during our meetings is the fact that 19 someone is coming in and checking pots. So one of the 20 pots I was talking about was President Frank's pot. 21 The guy just comes in to do bear hunting, it's the same 22 boat every year, it's no secret. We know now to watch 23 for them and take our pots out of the bay. But one of 24 the pots we've talked about, or I have mentioned was, 25 in fact, his pot. So there's a lot of conversation 26 between him and I about the resource and a lot of ideas 27 that I come up with come from him. 28 29 So that's local knowledge. 30 31 I grew up here. I remember fishing dog 32 salmon with his dad and seeing him and his brother up 33 to their shoulders in water holding the corks up so we 34 can get the fish. So just something we do for food. 35 It isn't -- like I said before, where the TV shows have 36 taken the word, subsistence, and glorified it, when, in 37 fact, it's something we do for a living. 38 39 So thank you, Mr. Chair. 40 41 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Albert. 42 And Angoon's been fortunate, they've had some strong 43 representation on the Council over the years, both from 44 you and from Floyd Kookesh there for many years. So 45 yeah, anybody else on the Council. 46 47 (No comments) 48 49 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, I don't

0380 think I'm hearing anybody else so once again thank you Mr. Frank for coming before the Council and telling us 2 what the situation is in Angoon so we do appreciate it. 4 5 (Line lost) 6 7 MR. DECKER: ....here in Southeast. 8 I'm grateful that we could participate in this process 9 on subsistence and see how our company can better 10 assist, you know, the subsistence program and that, 11 items that we might be concerned about and be aware of as we go forward and I'm grateful for the opportunity 12 13 to call in today and listen in and be a part of the 14 process and see how we can, as a company, and as guides 15 here in Southeast that we can better assist our local 16 communities. 17 18 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you. 19 I'm sorry I didn't catch your name at first. 20 21 MR. DECKER: My name is Zack Decker. 22 23 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Decker? 24 25 MR. DECKER: Decker, D-E-C-K-E-R. 26 27 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right, thank you. 28 Okay, thank you Mr. Decker. I don't know if any of the 29 Council members would like to ask you any questions, if 30 you're willing I'll see if anybody on the Council has a 31 question for Mr. Decker. 32 33 MR. SLATER: Mr. Chair, this is Jim 34 Slater. 35 36 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, Jim, go 37 ahead. 38 39 MR. SLATER: Yeah, Mr. Decker, could 40 you tell us a little bit about your guide business, 41 what kind of animals you pursue and where do you go and 42 so on? 43 44 MR. DECKER: Sure. Totally. So our 45 guide company has been around going on about 49 years. 46 My father-in-law started it many, many years ago. But 47 primarily we're in the northern part of Southeast, we

cover Admiralty, Baranof, Chichagof for brown bear and

deer, Kuiu, Kupreanof and the main land for black bear

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and the main land for mountain goat, and those are our primary species that we guide for there. Then we also do summer adventure tours and what not inside Glacier Bay National Park because we're a historical operator there. We're one of the few people that have, through the Forest Service, that have some permits and use dates in and around Angoon in the estuary -- in the Kootznoowoo area and so that's -- yeah, we take groups out. We're a second generation quide operator now, me and my wife, and our two boys and, you know, we start here coming up in April for spring black bear and we'll move over to brown bear.

MR. SLATER: Thank you, very much.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, thank you, Jim. Anybody else on the Council with any questions for Mr. Decker.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: I'm not hearing any. Yeah, but, thank you Mr. Decker for calling in. I'm glad you're listening in on our meeting and, yeah, we appreciate you giving your thoughts so thank you again. Thanks for answering questions. Is there anybody else on the phone line this morning who would like to comment to the Council.

MS. PHILLIPS: Chairman Hernandez, this is Patricia Phillips.

 $\label{eq:CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Good morning,} $$\operatorname{Patty, go ahead.}$$ 

MS. PHILLIPS: Good morning. Mr. Frank from Angoon sort of poked my mind a little bit. Like we're living with the consequences of decisions made over the last 50 years and, you know, ANILCA has been in place since, what, '79 and we're just getting to the point of where we're actually advocating for our Federally-qualified subsistence users. But I also want to remind the Council, you know, I tend to look at things holistically, that the impacts of decisions made have consequences on our rural communities. And what Mr. Frank mentioned was, you know, having no barge landing, having no airport, and having limited ferry service. Well, we have even more limited ferry service than Angoon does and during the winter months we only

get one ferry a month. And the current State of Alaska Administration threatened to remove our ferry service altogether because of the low revenues that it garners coming out here. And shutting down non-Federallyqualified harvesters could impact us during those months when we really, really rely on the ferry service to get our groceries out here. We work as a community, when the ferry comes in, the one ferry a month, to off load our groceries and get the ferry turned around as quickly as possible because we're so thankful for that service. So, you know, there are consequences to actions and I just wanted to remind you to be thinking holistically.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, thank you, Patty, for that reminder. Anybody on the Council with a question or a comment for Patty.

MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair, this is Ian.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: I heard Ian, go

ahead, Ian.

MR. JOHNSON: Hey, Patty, I think that's just a phenomenal point. And I guess while you have the floor, I was curious, do you have any other thoughts on potentially down the road -- or decisions you've seen in the past or other things that you consider to be possibly harmful, and the holistic situation, just, yeah, I want to continue to ask you to brainstorm with us, I guess, if you have other ideas.

MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you, Ian. Nothing's coming to mind right now but I know it'll come back to me later, I'll have a thought, I should have thought of that then. But I'll try to remember to bring it to your attention, so, thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thanks, Ian. Anybody else on the Council. I thought I heard somebody in the background there.

MR. SCHROEDER: Yes, this is Bob Schroeder. I don't get a chance to say hello to Patty very often anymore and on behalf of the Council, you know, we so appreciate your so many years of service on the Council and also being something of our in-house

1 ANILCA expert, you're sorely missed. I know people
2 need to move on and we were all appalled you weren't
3 reappointed by the Secretary some years ago.
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5 I think as, you know, you know ANILCA
6 really well, I think we're really talking about a food security issue and a community -- a cultural continuity
8 issue and so I think we got some territory put forward

really well, I think we're really talking about a food security issue and a community -- a cultural continuity issue and so I think we got some territory put forward there and when you were on the Council we made great strides in a number of areas in protecting subsistence in rural communities and maybe we have some direction to go on the issues that you just raised.

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But thank you again on behalf of the Council.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Bob.

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MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you, Robert.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Anybody else with a question or a comment for Patty Phillips while she's on.

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MR. BEMIS: Yes, this is Larry Bemis,

Yakutat.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Larry.

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MR. BEMIS: Yes, I would like to make a comment about this. You know, since we've had Covid and the State is getting depressed on its income and just really puts the whole thing in perspective about just how our resources are getting squeezed, both commercially and personally, as far as subsistence goes, or just living in general. I think that we should look -- get something -- a thought put in place that, you know, these communities that depend on the system getting cut off, a lot of times the reaction time to get adjusted to it doesn't seem to move fast enough. So I think that we've got to set up some sort of model to react to these instead of letting the paperwork drag out or another meeting or go through this sorts of hoops to try to get something on. I mean a lot of this is not going to get better until the State gets better, you know. And that is -- we're just slowly dragging backwards and we need to stay forward.

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So my thought is, is this is a very

important endeavor to address and proceed with because it's not just going to be one community, it's going to be another one and another one until things get better. And I really think this is a very important part and other organizations should look into.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you for those thoughts Larry. I don't know, any other comments for Patty or from Patty.

MR. HOWARD: Mr. Chairman, this is Albert.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Albert.

MR. HOWARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I quess like Patricia kind of sparked a thought, I quess. I know in the past I've mentioned every time they add a new user group to an existing subsistence resource, they should do the same EIS stuff they do for every other project. What impact is this going to have on the subsistence user, intended and unintended. Because we feel the full effect of it every time a new user group comes in and, wow, look at the resource they have in front of Angoon, we're going to hammer it and take it back to the cold storage so they can send it overseas to someone else. That's the worst feeling in the world when you're trying to feed your family and community members and you see someone come in and put their gear all over creation around here. It's like someone coming to a person at Costco and emptying out Costco right when you pull up to do your shopping, that's the same feeling. So I think there should be a mechanism that requires them to see what the impact's going to be on the area they're allowing this to happen.

I'll give you an example of what I've been watching lately is now I'm starting to see kelp becoming a resource so seaweed's going to become a resource and that concerns me. I'll save enough gas to get what I need and also help community members I know that can't go get it for themselves. And sometimes you burn up that gas and you come back with nothing.

So that's my thoughts, thank you, Mr.

49 Chair.

0385 1 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, 2 Albert. Is there anybody else on the Council who wants to make a comment or a question. 4 5 MR. KITKA: Don, this is Harvey Kitka. 6 7 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: I think I heard 8 Harvey. 9 10 MR. KITKA: Yeah, this is Harvey Kitka. 11 12 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, go ahead, 13 Harvey. 14 15 MR. KITKA: I had one comment or a 16 question for Patty. Is basically knowing she knows the 17 book so well that we miss that on the Council, having 18 to bring a book out and read it and try to catch up on 19 what's going on. But I was wondering if she could help 20 us with what Larry was talking about, and kind of 21 setting up an emergency thing that would cut down on 22 the paperwork and how long it takes to get help to 23 these communities that suffer when we lose the ferry 24 system. I know that it can get really touchy at times, 25 knowing the price of the food and stuff, and Angoon and 26 Kake could jump real bad because when they lose the 27 ferry system and lose the food source, boy that's got 28 to be tough. 29 30 (Teleconference interference -31 participants not muted) 32 33 MS. PHILLIPS: Thank you, Harvey. I 34 think you could possibly address it in your annual 35 report and just keep hammering on it. And make sure that the State of Alaska understands, you know, what 36 37 we're advocating for here and to not disregard our 38 needs out here. 39 40 But I would also say that, you know, 41 Albert, Council Member Albert Howard mentioned, you 42 know, gas, I mean we're paying 3.68 a gallon, I mean 43 how many times can you go out hunting when you got to 44 pay that much for fuel. You're not going out hunting as much as you used to, it's just a fact of the matter. 45 46

But, anyways, thank you, I appreciate

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49 50 it. I'm signing off.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Patty. Glad that you've been listening in and maybe we'll talk to you again here.

Okay, was there anybody else on the phone lines that's joined us since we started the public comment who would like to comment.

MR. DOUVILLE: Mr. Chairman, Mike

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Mike.

MR. DOUVILLE: I would just like to make this comment that Albert touched on something that is sensitive to us that we have -- he mentioned kelp and kelp farms, and we have an application for a kelp farm in an area that is sensitive to subsistence in several different ways, hunting, fishing, and so on, and that is in Real Marina, there's numerous seal haulouts, subsistence halibut fishing going on there, and the tribe is alarmed and opposed to it. We will make comment but down the road, while kelp farms may be fine, they do intrude on sensitive areas.

So that is my comment.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Mike. Something else -- yeah, I know I've heard more and more talk about kelp aquaculture around the region. Definitely something to keep on the radar so thanks for bringing that to our attention.

Is there anybody else from the public who wanted to comment to us this morning.

(No comments)

 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. I'm not hearing anybody so I think we'll wrap up the public comment period for this morning. And, you know, there were some interesting conversations during that public comment period and I got a feeling that we'll probably be addressing some of those ideas this afternoon, we might get into a topic of more cooperative management agreements and holistic management and keeping our villages intact and culturally strong. So a lot of topics there that are up before us, I believe.

But for now we'll get back to the agenda items that are important to conclude for this meeting and top of the list would be finalizing our wildlife proposals from the Council.

MR. CASIPIT: Mr. Chairman. Mr. Chair, this is Calvin Casipit. I'd like to say a few words before we launch off into the proposals -- the proposed proposals. The proposed proposals.

## (Laughter)

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cal.

MR. CASIPIT: Okay, thank you. This is mostly in regards to our Unit 4 deer issues that we've been working on. I haven't had a chance to really look through all the proposals that the -- the write ups that got sent out by DeAnna early this morning but hopefully I can here soon, but I was up all -- I was up and down all night thinking about this and I just got to say it. And I apologize to Staff, in advance, if I offend anybody.

But the first thing, in my mind, that we need to be providing as a Council is a meaningful subsistence priority. That's our job, is providing that meaningful subsistence priority. And in Unit 4, in general, you know, how do we provide that meaningful priority. We no longer have the bigger bag limit because the State, according to, you know, apparently, unbeknownst to me, I apologize for being out of the loop on it, but, you know, under State regs the bag limit's back up to six deer. So what's the meaningful priority for rural users in Unit 4. Basically designated harvesting, which is good. And a January hunt, that Staff can correct me, is less than five percent of the total season harvest from the last figures I remember. But maybe Staff can correct me. So I'm concerned about how we're providing that meaningful priority in Unit 4 in general first of all.

And then I have a concern about these closures in regards to displacement of those non-Federally-qualified users to other areas in Unit 4 that would be open to them. And, you know, I'm thinking sitting here in Gustavus and saying -- and I don't disagree with the closures that we have proposed, I'm not saying that, what I'm concerned about is the

displacement of those non-Federally-qualified users to places that are still open. And one of the places that would still be open would be that shoreline on Chichagof between Chicken Creek and Idaho Inlet that is the core area for the users in Gustavus and all of a sudden we're competing with people that have been displaced from Juneau that were normally hunting on West Admiralty and NECCUA and -- but, I don't have a problem with that, you know, I hope that they would all stay home but I know that's not going to happen. So that's one of the things that I'm concerned about, is that we'll just have this cascade of closures around these core areas over the years to try to keep up with displacement of these non-qualified users and wouldn't it be better to just have -- if we were going to do that, wouldn't be just better to just have a closure everywhere.

So these are just some of my thoughts. And like I said I don't want to say anything negative about the closures around these communities that have been asked for because I know they're needed.

And also, and I'm just going to close with this, you know, I really want Staff to take these —— we'll submit them, get Staff to do a really good job of doing the analysis on them, make sure we have a full discussion of some of those displacement issues, you know, I'm not opposed to submitting these proposals. But these are some of the kind of things, the grander bigger things that kind of kept me awake last night. And, you know, I kind of want to hear what the rest of the Council thinks of that.

 $$\operatorname{MR.\ HOWARD}\colon$\operatorname{Mr.\ Chairman},$$  this is Albert.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, just a minute Albert. Okay, so, Cal, you kind of led us into kind of a more broad ranging discussion here, not necessarily related to specific proposals yet. I don't know if there's some folks on the Council that would like to make some comments along those lines now, I guess that's okay. But let's not forget the fact that we still need to do some work on these specific proposals. And, you know, as Cal pointed out, all of this gets brought back to us after analysis for our deliberations and I know what Cal's doing, he's trying to frame the discussion, but just got to remind folks

we don't deliberate on the proposals in the proposal of preparing them, you know, that does come later. But just as a means to kind of frame the discussion if anybody wants to add anything to what Cal said now that's fine.

So Albert, go ahead.

MR. HOWARD: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I'll keep it short, I know you're trying to stay on the agenda and on topic. I appreciate Cal's comments. Keep in mind, Cal, that's what we live with every day in Angoon, sleepless nights on how we're going to provide for community members on the resources that are diminishing in front of us and we have no say over it.

So last night you got a taste of our daily lives in Angoon.

So, thanks, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thanks, Albert. Any other Council comments on this.

MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy.

MS. NEEDHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I appreciate where Cal is coming from and like he said, my comments, I don't mean to offend any community and I want the Council to know that as I sit on the Council I always put Federally-qualified subsistence users first. Like, Cal, I thought a lot about these proposals last night and I think about our Council putting forward these proposals and my question is slightly different than his because I'm actually coming from a place where I am a non-Federally-qualified user. And I think about Unit 4 deer and I think we heard yesterday during the testimony -- not testimony, but from somewhere in a presentation, I cannot recall where, that there's not a conservation concern for deer in Unit 4, however, there might be some localized concerns in Unit 4. I'm really hoping if these proposals go forward and we get to the analysis stage we can explore that a little bit more because I don't quite understand like deer numbers in terms of these specific localized areas in all of these places.

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I think as a Council we have to decide -- we listen to our constituents and we hear testimony from subsistence users throughout the region about their concerns and then we can be a mechanism for them to use certain tools towards finding more opportunity or better opportunity and that's where we get to where we can provide a subsistence priority for Federallyqualified subsistence users in our region. And I think that our Council does a very good job of this. And we can be a very, very powerful tool. However, as a non-Federally-qualified subsistence user I think about how I may or may not be able to hunt in Unit 4, how other non-Federally-qualified subsistence users may or may not be able to hunt in Unit 4 and I hesitate on cutting an opportunity off for non-Federally-qualified users that are Alaska residents. It's going to make it very difficult for myself and/or that portion of the population in Southeast Alaska to even understand the regulations that we're trying to potentially put forward because we are sort of postage stamping -basically taking that opportunity away before we even attempt to try to reduce bag limits or have restrict closures on non-residents of the state.

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And so I just -- in the broader picture of things, I'm wondering if we're doing or taking the right course by submitting all these proposals. I wholeheartedly respect that the community of Pelican has spent some time at this meeting and through Ms. Phillips at the last meeting testifying about this ongoing concern. I try to compare this back to the actions that we took in Unit 2, and I felt like in Unit 2 we still allowed non-Federally-qualified users some opportunity, all we did was reduce the bag limit and we've also taken past actions in reducing the season a little bit, but non-Federally-qualified users from Ketchikan can still go to Unit 2 and potentially harvest deer. So I'd like for us, as we move through these proposals to think about not necessarily taking a very large step and drastic action, but to maybe think about taking a little bit of a smaller step so that we can still work towards providing a subsistence priority and meeting the needs of the communities that may be struggling because of the potential increase in competition.

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Again, I mean no disrespect to anyone in my comments and I also understand that we can move forward with putting these proposals in and doing the

analysis, I think there's going to be a lot of additional -- we're going to find out a lot more about where this might go and I think we're going to hear from a lot of public at our next meeting as these proposals hit the Federal Subsistence Board.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Cathy. Yeah, you brought up a number of good points there and, yes, I guess we have to -- I know we definitely have precedent that we don't necessarily have to demonstrate conservation concern in every instance, you know, local depletion that can affect the -- you know the ability of the subsistence users to meet their needs. Meeting subsistence needs is the second part of justification for, you know, actions. So that's definitely something we can look at. But like you say, we also have to kind of take a broader view sometime on the other effects of regulation, or restrictions. So, yeah, all that needs to be considered and like you say taking incremental action is always an option.

MR. HOWARD: Mr. Chairman, this is

Albert.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: I'll turn it over to Albert. Go ahead, Albert.

MR. HOWARD: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. To be honest and Cal hit everything on the head and he shouldn't be apologizing for his comments, I totally understand where Cal was coming from, and now he knows what keeps us up at night in Angoon because it is happening. He's looking to the future and what the consequence of our proposal is. Now, listening to Cathy and adding someone's ability to come out of Juneau and hunt on the west side of Admiralty -- now, keep in mind, I didn't throw the east side in there because I realize Juneau residents use that side of the island to hunt and we don't hardly get over there. So they still have the opportunity to hunt that side of the island. I have a hard time feeling bad because if they have a bad day hunting they can go to Costco and Fred Meyers. I have a bad day hunting, I could be eating a bullhead for all you know.

You know taking little steps, we've

tried that. Nobody heard us. Time and time again we talked about our crab situation, but the person that was caught pulling the crab pots, his answer to the person was, oh, I'm friend's with these guys, but it isn't their pot. So these are real daily things we're living with in this community. If you want to understand Angoon, come and live here for six months. Leave your paychecks at home and come and live here.

Thanks, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Albert.

MR. SCHROEDER: Don, can you put me on

 the list.

17 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yep, go ahead, 18 Bob, I think you're up.

MR. SCHROEDER: Well, this is really interesting discussion and I kind of go in -- I've got three related things to say.

One is that I'm very proud of the work of this Council and maybe Patty's off, but she was very instrumental in helping our Council lead the Federal Subsistence Program in the right direction -- what we consider the right direction concerning customary and traditional use and I think we have some ability in two areas -- programmatic sounds like really boring but -and, you know, who would want to do that, we want fish, we want deer. But I think Cal is right on in talking about a need for preference. And I think forwarding in some way the proposals before us could help us get a full discussion going on what meaningful preference would mean for us and how we could create a position on meaningful preference perhaps for our Regional Advisory Council and help other Councils as well in the Federal Program to figure out what that means.

The second point has to do with local management. And, you know, really if we had significant local management and comanagement of natural resources perhaps the communities would feel that they, in fact, have control over what goes on with resources in their communities. Specific with respect to the indigenous communities, their traditional territories that were taken from them and their traditional territory boundaries which were well known

and respected before the Colonial rule. So in my dream world we'd be making progress with respect to local management and comanagement and we would develop positions on those things.

With respect to the specific proposals, you know, this Council should consider also pragmatics, just what we can accomplish and what is likely to go through the Federal Subsistence Board and how much we need to both the balance between -- it's not a balance -- how much we support the communities that come before us, considering the likelihood of actually getting a regulation that is really sweeping.

So those of us who were in the trenches on the deer wars on Prince of Wales for years and years we know it took years and years of communities coming forward saying that they were having trouble getting deer, years and years of data collection by Staff showing that this was, in fact, the case, and years and years of regulatory stuff to get relatively minor restrictions on non-Federally-qualified users. So that's kind of all in the pragmatic realm.

So I think we will definitely make -potentially make a good deal of progress in working on
what we mean by meaningful preference, that isn't
something that we've considered in great detail. I
think we'll be spending some time thinking about local
management and comanagement. And then with respect to
the specific proposals I think an awful lot hangs on
support for communities and consideration of what we
actually are likely to accomplish through the Federal
Subsistence Board.

That's it, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Bob. Anybody else on the Council, anything to add.

MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair, this is Ian, I'd like to add a couple things.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Ian.

MR. JOHNSON: Yeah, I can't help but reflect that this is really -- the discussion that Cal brought up is kind of hinges on what Patty spoke before is that, you know, our decisions have consequences and

that there's other things going down the road and one of the things that I was thinking about last night is thinking about these Unit 4 proposals is just ensuring that we don't put ourselves into, I guess what I would call language traps, and other things. I guess -maybe if it's a little bit on my unfamiliarity, we're submitting new proposals but I want to ensure that as we design these Unit 4 proposals, that we don't limit ourselves in the future in our language, what we're asking for. And so I just want -- so, you know, I guess I'm asking for a little bit of clarification on what constitutes a new proposal, say in a new cycle and how much of old proposals can be recycled into new ones.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Ian. We'll probably have that discussion when we get back to the proposals themselves.

MR. SLATER: Mr. Chair.

MR. KITKA: Don, this is Harvey.

MR. KITKA: I have just one question. Are we talking about our proposals or are we talking about the communities and helping the communities set up their proposals. It seemed like when I mentioned their needs not being met our Council kind of objected to that but I really think that when we ask the communities to do that it's best that they put it forward, that their needs are not being met, and ours is just kind of supporting what they say. Is that right?

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Well, yeah, thank you Harvey. I guess the way I view this, you know, the folks from Pelican, Angoon and Hoonah could all, you know, submit proposals from their individuals or communities, associations, whatever they have there and they may. But we heard, you know, a lot of public testimony from the folks in those communities and I think it's kind of the responsibility of the Council to respond to that and, of course, we have the ability to put in our own proposals and our proposals might be crafted a little differently than what a community might propose. So yes I think we definitely have the

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responsibility, I guess would be the right word, to respond to the public when they come before us and do the best we can to put together a proposal to address the issue. But they are certainly entitled to put in their own proposals that they think would address the issues. And when all the proposals come before us and we get the analysis, all the impacts and legalities and past histories and everything else then we choose one or meld several together, we have all kinds of options when it comes time for deliberations. So at this point in the process I think we just have the responsibility to put together the best proposal that we see fit to address the problems that were brought before us, and that's the way I view it.

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I heard somebody else with a question or comment besides Harvey.

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MR. SLATER: Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair, this is Jim Slater.

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Jim.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, go ahead,

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MR. SLATER: Hi. I wanted to respond to Cathy and I wanted to say, Cathy, I don't take lightly the impact on non-Federally-qualified hunters and it's something we agonize over. And I guess to discuss it, there's not a lot of tools that we have at our disposal from my understanding of how we can approach this. And I wanted to make one comment on the different use of tools, and we've talked about bag limit reduction, we've also talked about restriction -restricted dates. When it comes to affecting the take by subsistence hunters, it's not only the number of deer that are out there it's also the number of deer hunters, especially in a place like Lisianski Inlet which is one thin waterway. We kind of sit there and we say, okay, let's go hunting and we usually see some other boat heading up, you see that, okay, well you know where they're probably going to go so we have to change our hunting now. But when there's a stream of two or three boats getting up there you know that basically that whole area of the Inlet is not going to be as productive as it should have been or would have been. So we -- and a reduced bag limit may not -- it may reduce the number of hunters but it may not and it certainly won't do anything for the out of state hunters who are only coming there for one deer. And,

0396 so, anyway, that was a comment I made. 2 3 And I wish we had a broader set of 4 tools that we could finesse an approach but we don't at 5 this point and this may be the beginning of the discussion on can we -- either can we develop some more 6 precise tools that might effect our ability to protect 7 both the subsistence users and also give access to non-9 Federally-qualified hunters during the whole season. 10 11 So, anyway, that's enough of my 12 comments. 13 14 Thanks. 15 16 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Jim. 17 And I mean that is a responsibility of the Council is 18 we do -- we are required to consider impacts to other 19 users and so we do have to consider that in our 20 deliberations and recommendations to the Board. 21 22 MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair. 23 24 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Anybody else. 25 26 MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy. 27 28 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy. 29 30 MS. I've been on this 33 Council for 12 years and I'm going to do what I feel is 34 right for subsistence users in that hat and my non-35 Federally-qualified status is sort of not a hat that I 36 wear at this table necessarily. But I do want to say 37 that as a Council member I want to act responsibly through the big picture and I think our Council should 38 39 consider, potentially, putting together a proposal to 40 the Board of Game under -- for their next wildlife 41 cycle that addresses this concern as well. It would be 42 our due diligence. I kind of feel like I understand 43 that we're trying to -- we're grasping tools right now 44 to use, and I'm not entirely convinced that this is our 45 best tool but I'm going to support providing 46 opportunities for Federally-qualified subsistence 47 users, especially if they are experiencing a hardship 48 and not able to meet their subsistence needs, but I

think we have other tools in our tool box before we

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just automatically go to cutting off one user group completely, that's a user group that's a resident of this state, that, in my mind, has a little more precedence of being able to use that resources versus non-residents from out of state. And so I'd like for us all to be thinking of things in these proposals, how we can also potentially put in proposals to the Board of Game process that would reduce bag limits for non-residents of Alaska, and reduce sport bag limits rather than just cutting off one user group completely.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, thank you, Cathy. And, yeah, that's something that, you know, I realize in solving this problem may require some action on the State sporthunting regs and we can certainly put in proposals to them. I don't know where the cycle is now, it's a ways off I believe. But, yes, we do have an opportunity to do that and if we could ever convince the State to take some action, that could certainly be helpful so let's keep that in mind as well.

 $$\operatorname{Any}$$  other Council members with kind of broad reaching comments or questions before we get into the specifics here.

MR. WRIGHT: Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Frank.

MR. WRIGHT: You know I realize my responsibility on this Council is, you know, protecting our rural and subsistence issue -- you know, and I take that serious but, you know, I'm torn between two worlds, you know, as the president of the tribe and then I -- like the other day I talked about my family that lives in Juneau that are non -- that aren't qualified and hardships of our people that are -because they have to move out of town being -- to subsistence in Juneau at Costco and, you know, I belong to the (In Tlingit) and (In Tlingit) from Sitka and my dad is a Chookaneidi from Hoonah in the Kaagwaantaan and Wooshkeetaan and T'akdentaan that live here in Hoonah, so the people that are living in Juneau because of the way it is here, no jobs and the like, you know, so -- you know so being torn between two worlds of taking care of the rural subsistence area communities and being a Tlingit and trying to keep the culture of

our people alive by even sending them some deer meat or fish or halibut, you know, is kind of -- puts me, like I said, in two worlds. And, you know, I have a hard time by just thinking of my people when -- like I always said you take one component away from a people you diminish their identity. And right now the people of the -- the indigenous people of Southeast Alaska are having a hard time keeping their identity. You know Hoonah school is lucky that, you know, my wife is teaching the language here but, you know, the people I know in my family and stuff like that in Sitka and in Juneau are struggling too by trying to keep who they are.

But I know my responsibility as a RAC member, you know, I'm torn between two worlds and as the president of the tribe I have to try to keep the identity of our people alive, you know, and it's troubling because our language is pretty much decimated by -- even my mother went to Sheldon Jackson and she was told she couldn't speak her language and even though she was fluent she would never speak it in our household because she went to Sheldon Jackson and they took that away from her. My father was fluent.

I don't know if you guys can feel what I feel but by having my family in Juneau and Sitka and I have some family in Bellingham and I send them stuff sometimes. So I'll try to be with my responsibility as a RAC member as much as I possibly can.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Frank. That was very well put and, yes, I mean one of our responsibilities, you know, in the whole Subsistence Program here is to preserve the culture and we always have to keep that in mind and it requires a lot of hard decisions sometimes so, yeah, good thoughts, and thank you for that.

Is there anybody else with any other comments they'd like to add before we get into the discussion, specifics.

Cathy for her comments. There's going to have to be a lot of thought put into these proposals. It's a difficult situation, particularly when there is no conservation issue in at least most of Unit 4. And hopefully the analysis will do all that, keeping in mind that anything below the high water mark is State land, so it comes under State regulations as well private and State land in that unit. So all things considered I quess we'll do our job when it comes time but I do not look at things to be heavy-handed and I think that as we go down the road we'll hopefully solve these problems.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Mike. I'd like to get started into the proposals themselves now. And I know DeAnna sent out an email with proposed language. DeAnna, I don't know if you also are able to put that up on the Teams screen or I don't know if everybody's got access to email but it's helpful to have some wording in front of us that the Staff has prepared.

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MS. PERRY: Yes, Mr. Chair. I don't know which one you would like to start with first but we can certainly put that on Teams. And I did want to take a moment. We've had some great conversations with this Council this morning and wonderful public testimony, I just wanted to remind folks that as we go through these proposals, if the Council is not comfortable putting a proposal forward as a Council, it is always appropriate for an individual to put in a proposal. All of these proposals, whether they're put in by the Council or individually, will come before the Council in the fall regulatory meeting. And at that time we'll have the analysis, we'll have data, we'll have a lot more information, people will have had time to talk amongst their community members about the proposals once they come out in the proposal book. just kind of answering some of Ian's questions earlier, everything doesn't need to be set in stone now, not even the proposal, if the Council's not comfortable putting forward a proposal on its own, an individual can, but then the Council can still weigh in on that

0400 and make a recommendation in the fall. 2 3 So, anyway, I just wanted to maybe 4 provide some more information, especially to our new 5 Council members on the process so that they know there 6 are additional opportunities to look at a proposal, 7 amend a proposal and put a recommendation in on a 8 proposal. 9 10 Thank you, Mr. Chair. 11 12 Whichever proposal you'd like to start 13 with first. 14 15 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Well, I've got the 16 email up in front of me and the first one up there is 17 the elk proposal so if we'd like to start there maybe 18 we can look at a couple of the other proposals before 19 we get to those Unit 4 proposals. 20 21 MS. PERRY: So for those folks who got 22 the email, the file is named draft SERAC Unit 3 elk 23 draw proposal, and we have that up on the screen. 24 25 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. So if the 26 Council has that one up the first one is a proposal 27 that I suggested and this proposal would be to provide a subsistence priority for the existing elk hunt. And 28 29 presently there is a drawing hunt for elk and similar 30 to what we did up in Berners Bay where they established 31 a number of elk that -- or moose that they'd like to 32 harvest we designated a certain percentage of those 33 permits drawn would go to rural residents, or 34 subsistence-qualified people to make sure that in a 35 broad drawing where there might be hundreds of names 36 and people from all over the country perhaps it assures 37 that the local folks would get a priority to have a 38 permit drawn. So I'm going to ask maybe whatever Staff 39 put the wording to that proposal, if they could maybe 40 run through it and describe -- there's a lot of 41 boundary lines set that probably corresponded to 42 existing State regulations I'm guessing and then maybe 43 explain the permit draw system. 44 45 MR. SUMINSKI: Mr. Chair, this is Terry 46 Suminski, can you hear me all right?

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, go ahead,

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Terry.

MR. SUMINSKI: Yeah, I threw this one together and I'm sure it's not perfect. I would rather spend a couple weeks on it. Basically what I did is, is you're correct, I copied the hunt boundaries from the State draw for these two drawings. I think that's important to match up with the State draw because we did the same thing in Berners Bay and we have that stipulation where you cannot — if you get a State draw permit, you can't get a Federal permit. So to keep everything consistent and lined up I used the same — I just pulled that language basically out of the State draw supplement. I'm not super familiar with the area so I didn't have time to go through and draw the lines around there but I believe it's just Etolin Island.

I used similar language to what we used for Berners Bay. In this case there would be two drawings because there's two hunt periods. Harvest limit one bull elk if you're lucky enough to draw a Federal permit, only one elk per household. If you receive a State draw permit you cannot get a Federal permit for the same -- for elk.

So it'd have to be based off of the harvest quota. When I looked at the State draw there was 50 permits available in the last drawing for each hunt so if we take 25 percent that's roughly 12 or 13 would go to Federally-qualified.

And then the last part is just information that's also in the State drawing that would aid in the management of the herd with some biological samples and both of the antlers.

The rest of it, you know, the Council can beat that up, we didn't get a lot of discussion about that yesterday but kind of a quick overview.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Terry. And I'd just like to reiterate that I brought this up because, you know, elk are an introduced species and that's the situation that's similar to Berners Bay, where moose were introduced, they were not found there naturally. Elk have been there for quite a number of years now. Last year the Subsistence Board accepted our proposal to declare that there was customary and traditional use for elk in Southeast now

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    because elk have been here long enough and I know I
    don't know the specific numbers but, you know, a good
    percentage of the folks that put in for those drawing
    permits for elk do go to rural users and I'm pretty
    sure that rural users have taken a fair amount of the
    harvest of those elk so I felt it was appropriate that
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    we kind of institute that there would be a priority,
    some kind of a meaningful priority for the harvest of
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     those elk.
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                     And this concept kind of mirrors what
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    was done for Berners Bay once it was decided by the
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    Board that there was a customary and traditional use
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    for Berners Bay moose and there should be a Federal
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    priority for that hunt. So that's the idea and concept
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    for this proposal.
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                     So now I guess maybe for any further
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    discussion if somebody on the Council would like to
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    make a motion to accept this proposal then we could
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    have further discussion.

KITKA: Thank you. 13 14 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: And, Harvey, for 15 more clarification, the lines that are indicated there, or the boundaries indicated in the proposal are 16 17 essentially Etolin Island. I think it -- and it 18 excludes some of the smaller islands kind of 19 surrounding Etolin Island and, yeah, to the best of my 20 knowledge all of Etolin is Forest Service Federal land 21 and there is also a Etolin Island Wilderness area included on that island. 22 23 24 MR. KITKA: Thank you. 25 26 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Any other 27 questions. 28 29 MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy. 30 31 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy. 32 33 MS. NEEDHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 34 I don't have a question. But since we have put a 35 motion on the table to submit this proposal I would 36 just like to express that I would support this proposal 37 to be submitted to the Federal Subsistence Board. 38 know that this Council has talked about potentially putting a proposal like this forward but we took the 39 40 time during the last wildlife proposal in order to get 41 C&T determination for elk so we've taken a couple of 42 steps to move in this direction in order to provide a 43 little more meaningful subsistence priority for 44 subsistence users in getting this. 45 46 I also feel like we've discussed or 47 talked about, in the past, that it's a draw permit and 48 a number of those draw permits that don't -- they don't 49 necessarily get utilized and so, you know, I would

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     support assuring that Federally-qualified users had a
     little bit of a greater chance of being able to get a
    draw permit because I know Federally-qualified users
    would use that permit if they were to draw one and so
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    this provides that priority for them up front and gives
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    Federally-qualified subsistence users an actual
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     allocation out of the permit.
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                     I'd like to say I really appreciate

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     don't think we could have gotten that far in this -- of
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     what they put together for us.

    proposal that's next up in the email, and that's the
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     other elk proposal. So I'll just kind of give a brief
     overview of this and when the State started having elk
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     seasons at some point the elk started migrating to
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     adjoining islands. Elk have been reported on Prince of
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     Wales, they've been reported on Kupreanof, probably
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    Mitkof, they definitely moved to Zarembo and Bushy and
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     Shrubby, some of the islands that are in the vicinity.
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     So it was kind of determined that the State didn't
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     think it was a good idea for elk to spread everywhere
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     from where they were originally introduced on Etolin
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     Island. And the history of the elk introduction was, I
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    mean they were brought to Etolin Island as a -- for the
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     sporthunting opportunity, basically. It was an attempt
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     to transplant elk to Southeast Alaska and then the
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     State's intention was that, you know, big game hunters
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     would come to Southeast Alaska and use guide services
     to go elk hunting and -- anyhow once the elk started
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     leaving Etolin Island and spreading to adjoining
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     islands, at some point the State decided that maybe
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     that wasn't such a good idea for elk to start
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    populating elsewhere. There is some impact to habitat
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     from having large numbers of elk. They are capable of
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     out-competing deer for browse, you know, particularly
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during hard winters. So the State instituted a general season for elk outside of their original area where they were transplanted. And their regulation at the time was from August 1st to December 31st, one elk, doesn't necessarily have to be a bull, was available to anybody on those other islands. And then I don't know what year it was but for some reason the State decided to rescind that regulation. And I don't know it's just my feeling that -- I thought it was a good regulation. I know I hunt areas where elk have been spotted and I always felt if I ran across an elk I certainly would want to shoot it and I am a little concerned about some of the impacts to the habitat from, you know, a large number of elk so that's why I proposed this regulation that would essentially restore for Federally-qualified people that general hunt outside of the area where the elk were originally introduced.

So Terry, I don't know if you wrote up this regulation as well. Maybe you could go through the language a little bit and make sure everything I said was proper and the language reflects that.

MR. SUMINSKI: Yes, Mr. Chairman, this is Terry Suminski. Yeah, Rob Cross pulled this together. He found the old language that you asked for.

Something that we did put in here is to keep Bushy, Shrubby and Kaskevarof Islands closed as well, and that's to make it consistent with the draw hunt proposal. You have to understand that this would be -- we wrote it as a stand-alone proposal. It would have to be modified a little bit if the draw, you know, if the draw situation went into effect. But just looking at this particular proposal with the way the regulation would read, similar, you know, one antlered bull outside of that closed area, and that's about it.

 Rob did send me some harvest information just for your -- just to help you out. The chart from 1997 to 2010 which is the most recent. The harvest ranged from 14 animals -- 14 harvested in 1999 to down to one animal in 2006. So even though they may issue a lot of permits, it's a very difficult hunt so not everybody's successful.

Thank you.

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                     CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you,
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    Terry. I'm aware of the success rate on that hunt, it
    hasn't been very great. And I don't think anybody
    knows if anybody's harvested an elk off of those other
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     areas. I always hear rumors but nothing confirmed.
    But I have seen elk sign on POW and on Kupreanof so I
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    know they're there.
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                     Anyhow, maybe if the Council would
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    like, it's appropriate to make a motion on this
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    proposal now.
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                     MR. CASIPIT: Mr. Chair, this is Cal
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    Casipit. I just had a couple of questions and maybe we
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would maybe want to have Staff change some of this wording. But anyway let me just launch into this.

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I agree with your summary of the history and impacts of elk in the Southeast Alaska habitat. I know that when it was first being proposed there was a significant number of people who were interested in elk because you can have an industrial timber program and a large ungulate to hunt at the same time and you don't have to, you know, you don't have to worry about impacts on Sitka black-tailed deer. there was a lot of that talk going around too.

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Anyway, as far as the area where we would have the no close season with one antlered bull, it says Unit 3 remainder, shouldn't we add, Unit 2 as well, if you're noticing elk sign on north Prince of Wales.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, oh, yeah, you're right Cal. I kind of missed that.

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MR. CASIPIT: But other than that I'm totally okay with this proposal.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. If we want to change the wording I suggest that we -- let's see, maybe we should -- I guess we should probably maybe change the wording -- have a discussion on changing the wording first and then make a motion, that might be best. Maybe our Parliamentarian can weigh in here, should we get it on the floor and then amend it or amend it first and then bring it up.

And I doubt we can get the State to answer that question since they're probably out at the Board of Game meeting today. But I just wanted to throw that out there as a thought.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. You know at this point of the process, I'm tempted to just leave it the way it is because I was attempting to mirror, you know, previous State regs. And, you know, these kind of topics are certainly addressed in the analysis and when they come back to us we can consider all of these questions and proposals can always be amended at the time that we deliberate on them. So I think for now I'd recommend just leaving it the way it is.

 MR. CASIPIT: Mr. Chair, this is Cal Casipit. And I kind of -- I would like to speak to actually including cows. Number 1 because, again, like the subsistence -- you know additional opportunity that was said by Ian earlier, but also in my mind let's just go ahead and ask for it. If Staff believes it's a bad idea to include cows, we can always remove it next fall, but if we don't ask for cows now they won't analyze cows. So I'm of the opinion that we include cows.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Cal. That's a good point. I guess I can't argue with that. So if you'd like to further amend the motion I guess now would be the time to do that.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. And I think that's kind of implied being a Federal regulation and our C&T determination is for all rural residents, 1 through 5, so under those conditions I think being a Federal hunt would indicate that.

MR. DOUVILLE: Well, you can hunt but what we're looking for is a Federal draw hunt for any bull.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Ah, right, okay.

MR. DOUVILLE: You know I think it would offer more subsistence opportunity without having to like if you go hunting there now under current regulations and not find a legal bull although there's adequate numbers, there's no conservation issues or anything, but it becomes kind of difficult to find the exact right one.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. So I'm looking at the proposed language here and it doesn't say -- make any mention of a drawing. It says, you know, 20 bull moose, which in my understanding is any bull moose, not necessarily the one antlered -- or spike-fork 50 inch or three brow tine, all that language, but it doesn't say by -- it says by Federal permit but I think your intent was to have a drawing for that permit, correct?

MR. DOUVILLE: That would be correct although it would be adequate either way but I think it would be more fair to have a draw hunt.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. I wouldn't know how to do it otherwise actually so let's get -- let's get it before the Council as a motion and then if we want to amend it we can do that.

MR. SUMINSKI: Yeah, thanks, Mr. Chair, for the chance to explain. I was pretty tired when I wrote this up to be honest with you. And I was really struggling with having a draw permit on a population that we have no population estimates for. So the percentage idea wouldn't work because we don't know what percent of, you know, how many animals. What controls the population in this unit is the spike-fork 50, which allows just certain males to be taken.

So I think what we -- if we just -- the problem with the way it's written, of course, is the -- you know, 20 bulls, they could be taken within the first minute of the season and we'd have no way to stop it quick enough. So I think this -- you could use the same language and insert similar language that we have in the elk draw permit, we'd have to modify it a little bit, it might take a few minutes, but we could do that if you want us to do that first before you try to, you know, do it through Roberts Rules. If that would be helpful, I could probably, 10, 15 minutes get it cleaned up a little bit to make it clear of what Mike's intent was.

## Thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Well, yeah, if you think you can do that. It just -- you know, talking about the number associated with it, I mean right now it is an open hunt, there is no set quota. So that makes it different from, like, Berners Boost -- or Berners Bay moose where they set a quota and issue -- have a drawing for so many permits. So I guess I realize that the 20 bulls is somewhat of an arbitrary number although there's, you know, fairly consistently been around 100 bulls harvested over a number of years. So I mean that does seem like, for now, that's a pretty reasonable number. It's close to that, you know, 25

percent, that we've talked about in Berners Bay kind of priority. Yes, I think there would have to be a drawing to see who's qualified, or who's eligible to shoot a moose that doesn't conform to the 50 inch antler restriction. And that's -- I mean that's kind of based -- I'd consult with Mike with this but it's kind of based on the fact that the population is pretty healthy, that spike-fork 50 inch, you know, three brow tines all of that has been apparently pretty successful in building a pretty good herd. So, you know, can we take some of those as below that requirement and not do any harm to the population. I guess that's the issue before us.

And, I don't know, Mike, do you want to add anything to that.

MR. DOUVILLE: No. It would have to -in order to be successful, the analysis would have to
show you could do that. The other thing is you must
have a draw hunt in order to control the numbers,
otherwise, just a Federal permit, things could quite
easily get out of hand, and in fact probably would. So
a Federal draw hunt would strictly regulate how many.
20 is an arbitrary number, I guess, and the analysis
would tell you if it's okay or less or whatever. So,
yes, that's my thought.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. And people would have to keep in mind that the majority of the hunters, probably overwhelming majority of the hunters that take advantage of the moose hunt are Federally-qualified.

MR. SUMINSKI: Mr. Chairman, this is Terry Suminski. Would you like -- maybe we could have Greg edit on the screen or do you want me to do that and you can put it back up.

NEEDHAM: This is Cathy, and it 6 sounds like Don is trying the trick of hanging up and 7 calling back in so maybe I'll just try to move us forward and step into his role for a few moments while 9 we're waiting for that. For those that can't see the 10 regulation, the words that were added -- we're looking 11 at a proposed Federal regulation here for Unit 2 moose. 12 The previous regulation language that we're keeping was 13 from September 15th to October 15th, one antlered bull 14 with spike fork or 50 inch antlers or three or more 15 brow tines on either antler or antlers with two brow tines on both side by State registration permit only. 16 17 18 The added language would include on 19 Kupreanof and Kuiu up to 20 bull moose may be taken by 20 Federal draw permit. Harvest limit is one bull moose 21 per Federal draw permit. Only one bull moose permit 22 will be issued per household. A household receiving a 23 State draw permit for moose may not receive a Federal 24 permit. The annual harvest quota will be announced by 25 the USDA Forest Service Petersburg Ranger District 26 Office in consultation with the Alaska Department of 27 Fish and Game. Successful hunters are required to send 28 a photo of their moose antlers to the Alaska Department 29 of Fish and Game and a five inch section of lower jaw 30 with front teeth. 31 32 So that's the way the new language 33 read. And at this time are there any comments or 34 questions from the Council. 35 36 MR. CASIPIT: This is Cal. That part 37 where you read about if you have a State draw permit 38 you're ineligible for a Federal one. I don't think we 39 need that language because there is no State draw 40 permit. It's all a registration spike fork 50. 41 42 MR. SUMINSKI: This is Terry Suminski. 43 Thanks, Cal. I was contemplating that in case it did 44 go to a draw but it probably wouldn't be the same area 45 so I'd get rid of that sentence. 46 47 Thank you. 48

I note that the spike fork 50 requirement on this and 38 39 for that matter with some other hunts around the state, 40 basically has been a way to deal with making things 41 slightly more manageable. So creating kind of a hybrid hunt 45 like this because in Unit 3 almost all the moose are 46 taken by subsistence users allows some access to the 47 permit system for some of the more tastier critters.

So, again, my document didn't really look at the -- or the one passed out by DeAnna didn't really look at the management mechanisms but does provide further justification for the need for this regulation.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, Ian. Okay, I'm looking at the screen here. Let's see any comments from the Staff on how they determined to word this proposal.

Anybody else with an opinion on that. 30 31 MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy. 32 33 MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair. 34 35 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: I heard Cathy 36 first and then somebody else. Go ahead, Cathy. 37 38 MS. NEEDHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 39 You know when we put the proposal forward for the 40 reduction of bag limit to non-Federally-qualified 41 subsistence users for Unit 2 deer, we had been hearing 42 for years the -- from subsistence users from numerous 43 communities within that unit regarding the issues for 44 Federally-qualified subsistence users to be able to 45 obtain deer and the amount of competition pressure that was given on that population and because we actually 46 47 were working on that particular issue for years before

we took proposal action, the Alaska Department of Fish

and Game was able to give us harvest survey numbers to

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let us know what the normal harvest for non-Federally-qualified subsistence users were and then when we decided on a bag limit it was based on that we were reducing opportunity for non-Federally-qualified subsistence users to harvest there but that they would still be able to get one or two deer so that regulation that this Council put forward that passed the Federal Subsistence Board process was to limit harvest to two deer by non-Federally-qualified subsistence users.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Cathy. And you're correct. There were some good survey numbers and it did show that non-Federally-qualified users, on average, despite the fact that there was a four deer bag limit, typically harvested around two deer. So that influenced our decision there. And I'm guessing that there's probably that same type of information available in Unit 4. I think they do mailout surveys there as well. So don't know what that number is but we can certainly, at some point look at that. I don't know if we'd have to get an exact number in the regulation, in the proposal right now, I mean, you know, we can adjust as we get more information from our analysis. So I'd say just pick a reduction and go from there.

So somebody else wanted to make a comment, I didn't hear who that was.

MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair, that was Ian.

34 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Ian.

MR. JOHNSON: Yeah, just in line with Frank, I thought an appropriate action would be the reduction. I'm also unsure of the correct number to ask for but I mean three seems like it should be the max but, yeah, I don't have any background or ability to advise on a number exactly.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. If somebody's ready to put forward an amended motion now might be the time.

That is an option to add to the proposal to 14 consider what people think about that, but if anybody's 15 ready to offer up an amendment, an amended proposal go 16 ahead. 17 18 MR. SLATER: Mr. Chair. 19 20 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead. 21 MR. SLATER: Hi, Mr. Chair, this is Jim 22 23 Slater. I would just like to ask Mr. Suminski, how has 24 the bag limit reduction to two on Prince of Wales in 25 Game Unit 2, how has that worked, what effect have you 26 seen, have you seen less hunters, have you seen less 27 deer, what is the end result. I guess I don't know when it went into play, I don't know how long it's been 28 29 en force. But I'm just curious what the result has 30 been. 31 32 Thank you. 33 34 MR. SUMINSKI: Through the Chair. Mr. 35 Slater, I don't live on Prince of Wales. I don't 36 experience, you know, what may have changed due to 37 that. It might be better to direct that question to 38 Mr. Douville. 39 40 Thank you. 41 42 MR. SLATER: Mr. Douville, do you have 43 any information along those lines? 44 45 MR. DOUVILLE: I don't remember all of 46 your questions but it is difficult to enforce. 47 However, we have less hunters it appears. I've also 48 looked at the Facebook deer groups and, you know, for

the last couple of years, several of them have

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recommended not coming over here, but we also have less deer. And a healthy wolf population so that has all had an effect, it's not just wolf that is an issue here, it's second growth closing in under story going away. So the deer harvest here still appears to be going down hill. But in our case there's a lot of private and State land mixed amongst the Federal land so while the regulation is in place it's difficult to really enforce.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, I could weigh in on that as well, Mike. And, yeah, Tom Schumacher, when he kind of ran through his run down on the previous hunting season, he did make note of the fact that there did appear to be a good bit of effort from off island hunters in Unit 2 this past year after we instituted that reduction. And, you know, it's kind of two factors. For the previous several years the success rate for all hunters has been going down on Prince of Wales, and at the same time that area close to Ketchikan, Unit 1A, has seen an increase in deer and an increase in effort, and there's still a four deer bag limit in Unit 1A as I recall. So just through -- I don't know if it was necessarily through our regulation or just the fact that deer hunting is beginning to improve closer to Ketchikan and people coming over here, but there was a definite decrease in the number of off island hunters hunting here in the last -actually probably in the last two years now. So like I say it's hard to say if the regulation change alone but it could have been an influence.

The other thing is when you have a situation where you have a lesser bag limit in one area than the other, if let's say somebody were to shoot a deer in Unit 1A early in the season and they had a tag punched, if they came to Prince of Wales they would only have one tag available to harvest over here and they would still have three tags available for harvest over in Unit 1A. So when you have different bag limits in different areas, when you shoot your deer also has a big influence on where you decide to hunt. So it's not worth coming over here, make that long trip on the ferry and all that's involved if you've only got one tag. So there's factors.

 $$\operatorname{But}$  overall we've definitely seen less effort in Unit 2 since the regulation.

0455 1 MR. WRIGHT: Mr. Chair. 2 3 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Frank. 4 5 MR. 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ago the tribe ACA submitted two proposals, Kootznoowoo submitted two proposals and the city of Angoon submitted two so a total of six proposals went to the Board of Fish and none of them were considered. The only one they allowed and put on the floor was the total closure to salmon seining in Chatham Strait. 6 7 would you put that one on the floor for consideration because you know that one for sure is -- everyone's 9 going to shake their head and say no way. All the 10 other proposals, the other five had -- and probably 11 would have passed but I think our frustration in Angoon 12 is not being heard, or not being considered when 13 starting a new fishery or when starting something that 14 seems to generate funds for the State no one considers 15 what that does to a community like Angoon.

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One of the comments was surprising to me, a person I've never met before, I guess they have a history of hunting bear on Admiralty Island but I can honestly say I don't know who they are. They were saying that what I'm doing is based on emotion and not science. They also stated that the January hunt, according to the Fish and Game, mostly fawns and does were being taken. I taught my sons this years ago and I learned it from my dad and my brother, all deer look the same when you're looking from a boat but if you look through the scope and you look at the nose of the deer, if it's real short it's a fawn. So even my sons know, we'll get up and move on. Mr. Chairman, I know in the record I spoke of I believe last year I was out on a hunt and a lot of the deer were skinny and I passed on them and I finally found one that didn't look like it was in bad shape so I took it home but I skipped out on a lot of deer and I never consider fawns even if I am starving. So I know what -- I've been pushing this rock up the hill and what's happening in Chatham does keep me awake at night because I know this is a resource that has provided for this community forever. You heard Mr. Wright speak of his ties to the area around Hoonah. I served on the city council and one of the favorite things of some of the locals here to do is to tell me traditionally I'm not from Angoon because my mother is Raven Sea Pigeon which is from Hoonah. One of the elders asked if that was the case, did this person really get up and say I'm not from Angoon and I told him, yes, he tied me to this land, my grandfather. The person my dad named me after, Albert Howard had a fort in Cheiek, it's just south of Angoon on Admiralty Island so I have blood ties to this land,

So when I put something like this forward it's meaningful to the community and we get it, we understand. We know the consequences of it. Every time we try to do something reasonable and make sense to Angoon residents the Fish and Game shows up, every time. It's almost on a level of harassment. If we get caught with one king salmon, you're in a lot of trouble. Yet the draggers out on the west are allowed bycatch 30 to 40,000 pounds and we just want one.

SAWERS CONTRERAS: My name is 27 Rebekah Sawers Contreras and I will be speaking first and then I'll be handing it over to Wanda Culp. 28 29 30 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. 31 32 MS. SAWERS CONTRERAS: My name is 33 Rebekah Sawers Contreras and I'm a part of Womens Earth 34 Climate Action Network and I am a member of the Hoonah 35 Indian Association. Because the United States is One Nation Under God I want to start by saying, you and I 36 37 are living in a nation built on dehumanizing. Doctrine 38 of discovery. These are the foundations on which your 39 ancestors and your current self and system are still 40 holding accountable to this day. American exploitive 41 Colonial violence across indigenous territory. It is 42 now 200 years later and we are bringing the same 43 interpretation. We come to you, the Federal 44 Subsistence Board, whose voice is supposed to make a 45 difference in representing, but when it comes to our 46 indigenous issues no one is accountable. Here we are

two years later saying the same thing and yet no one is

48 49 50 accountable.

6 7 I want to be accountable that you know that you and I are made up of elements, mostly carbon, oxygen, hydrogen and nitrogen, just as this earth is made of these elements. The atmosphere, the stars are also made of these elements. And I want you to know that only 36 percent of our earth, of our body remains. 66 percent, over half of our earth is exploited. Even the predicted two degree increase in the next few years will hurt everyone and everything.

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We are sharing our indigenous intellect today. We are declaring indigenous sovereignty on our territory. The indigenous people are, have been, will be permanent inhabiting and we are connected by history, culture and commonality. Our indigenous populations and institutions are thriving. We are in talks today of setting things straight for our future to survive. Not only survive, but to be successful. Because of our permanent sovereign state on this territory and knowledge and commonality, it is clear that the current Colonial state in charge has destroyed 66 percent of the natural life over the past 200 years. And we will no longer sit back and allow you to monetize and compare everything but yourselves in this ecosystem. Compare that all agencies are in favor of industry. Compare your nation to our nation. Compare your symbols. Compare your ideas. Compare your uses. Compare your interpretations. Compare your resource standpoints. Compare your assets. People in higher positions have done nothing but justify punishing, wages and criminalizing indigenous people. Compare the punishment the male non-Native artist got for exploiting indigenous art to the Native artist charged for participating in the Marine Mammal Protection Act. To this day I see no shame in exploitation, instead you camouflage exploiting in words like sustainability or blank works for Alaska. Agriculture. Subsistence. Economy. Rural and urban. With 36 percent of natural world left I find it illogical to continue to exploit on this territory. I do not trust your validation on the structure you claim. From the Roadless Rule situation to corporations in charge of Native cultural programs at National Parks instead of indigenous tribes. The structure of the Marine Mammal Protection Act is clearly not protecting the marine mammals and is totally for the exploitations of industrial society.

We are here interpreting, defining and justifying our grandparents ancestors way of life,

indigenous concepts. The ownership of our inhabitants is recognized nationally and internationally. With our cultural knowledge I put my trust in full participation in dissimilation and expanding Tlingit and Haida's social service's obligations to cover land management, natural resources and management of food sovereignty, alongside housing and general services and education. Grassroots tribal reports the future is ours to envision and inhabit.

We appreciate you listening to our interpretations of NEPA, ANILCA and ANCSA today, and here is Wanda Culp.

MS. CULP: Gunalcheesh Rebekah. And Gunalcheesh to everybody that's working these last couple of days. I know it's been a tedious affair and I'm grateful for the time we have right now.

(In Tlingit)

MS. CULP: I'm also a member of the Hoonah Indian Association and a member of the Womens Earth and Action Climate Network.

WECAN Tongass' concept serves to reverse the downplay of tribal history and governing and create a language of inclusion equally weighted in value to industries, society. A new frame must be created through indigenous prescription and interpretation of laws intended for National, tribal, land conservation and environmental protection.

The food sovereignty proposal concept being presented to you is rooted in indigenous intellect. We are seeking traditional natural resource security for healthy communities, land, air, waters and climate justice. This concept rides on the U.S. Constitution, laws of the land and our intelligence. Every one of us plays an important role. Federallyrecognized tribes are legal instruments of our National government. ANILCA holds 229 recognized tribal village governments within a land mass of 420 million acres of 1959 State of Alaska, 1971 Alaska Native Settlement and U.S. Federal lands where about 14 Federal agencies conduct Uncle Sam's affairs. Five of those Federal agencies are Congressionally composed of the Federal Subsistence Board and administered by two Secretaries, Interior and Agriculture. Additionally, the Federal

1 Subsistence Board dual manages subsistence by outsourcing the use of State and Federal law enforcements and associated with courts without an established due process capability for those of us 5 charged for illegal hunting and fishing. The Federal Subsistence Board uses State of Alaska's 10 game units 6 7 under its sportfish and game laws. The State of Alaska is out of legal compliance of the Alaska National 9 Interest Lands Conservation Act called ANILCA, along 10 with other land conservation laws. The 1971 Alaska 11 Native Claims Settlement Act, ANCSA, created 12 Alaska Native regions. The 1980 ANILCA is a compromise of 12 13 ANCSA. All associated programs should be managed 14 within these 12 Federally-recognized Native regions for 15 uniformity, simplicity, and expediency. In 1969 the Interior's Environmental Protection Agency became the 16 17 parent for the National Environmental Protection Act, 18 NEPA, requiring an environmental impact statement for 19 any major Federal actions on public and Indian owned 20 lands for review and comment. The U.S. EPA's 21 responsibility includes management of natural resource 22 use and protections. It makes sense for this agency to 23 become a part of the Federal Subsistence Board. The 24 2020 industry and foods fiasco causing the illegal 25 overturning of the 2001 Roadless Rule is a perfect 26 example as the Secretary of Agriculture's Forest 27 Service excluded the Federal Subsistence Board in its 28 Roadless Rule EIS, environmental impact statement. 29 Last week the lead agency for the Federal Subsistence 30 Board.

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The Interior, Fish and Wildlife Service, barely slapped the wrist of a fake ivory carver Anchorage business owner for violations under the 1972 Marine Mammal Protection Act and for misrepresenting Alaska Native art for the purpose of sale. And this isn't his first violation. Tlingit and Haida Tribes have endured Fish and Wildlife criminal charges for use of bird feathers on ceremonial objects, for selling herring eggs, for transporting sea otter pelts. The Fish and Wildlife Services to have their priorities backwards and lack a grip on the definition of customary traditional use also called subsistence.

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46 47 The Interior's National Park Service has failed the Tlingit miserably. 1996 banning of our traditional activities and economies to favor the State of Alaska's new blooming business, the cruiseline industry. Up to 25 huge ships come enter Glacier Bay

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National Park daily into pristine whale infested waters of our homeland, Glacier Bay. Had the Covid-19 not hit in 2020 Hoonah's Icy Strait Point would have had 211 ships in our midst holding 450,000 passengers from different cruise ships apart from Glacier Bay's. This is an example of the State's lack of costal management control of Alaska's navigable waters free from negative impact mitigation.

The Interior's Bureau of Indian Affairs administers tribal self-determination, self-governing contracts, grants, and compacts across Alaska. This is a good time along with their Bureau of Land Management to apprise Alaska Native landholdings and interests to identify Federal trust aspects like Native allotments and townsite lots and associated property interests and to conform to a uniform sister of inter and intra agency communication compliance, reporting, reparation plans, preventions and (indiscernible) reservations.

If the Federal agencies connect their attention and resources as equally as they do for industry and if the tribal governments are provided full support from each agency towards food sovereignty we will truly become one of today's political winds of change. Still, there exists the old Republican political party mood of industry only priorities. Last week the Alaska Republican Party voted to condemn Alaska's U.S. Senator Lisa Murkowski to seek (indiscernible) more in line with their philosophy in the 2022 election. Here's a few of the things listed against Senator Murkowski. She voted to full impeachment of Trump from the U.S. Presidency. She voted against the repeal of the Affordable Care Act. She voted against confirmation of the U.S. Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh. She voted for Congresswomen Deb Haaland for Secretary of Interior, yes. And she stands her ground to the oath of the U.S. Constitution and commitment to Alaska's people. The arrogance of the Alaska Republic Party dissed the vote of the people who elected Lisa Murkowski to office on a write in campaign. We do not lack in political power. As people, we can influence change towards healing, growing, thriving on healthy land, breathing fresh air and depending on clean salt and fresh water for all the (indiscernible)....

(Teleconference interference - participants not muted - overlapping conversation)

MS. CULP: ....they provide globally. Each us play an important role in the intelligence that's going to require on the road back to healthy, back to our ability to do for ourselves and our family, back to our individual and group sovereignty. Each of us are assets towards the ability to determine the quality of our lives and destinies of our future generations. Let us begin with root knowledge, and build up from that solid foundation, together we can.

I hope to extend, respect, that recognition to Patty Phillips, she should be on the Board, yet, she's always contributing plenty for us.

Gunalcheesh to you folks for listening to us and hearing us out. And, please, we'll be glad to know what happens to our proposal concept.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Thank you, Rebekah and Wanda. I'll open it up if you'd like to answer some questions from the Council members, they probably have some for you. Council members, I'll give you a chance to digest -- there was a lot of information there but if anybody's ready to ask a question, the floor is open.

MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy.

MS. NEEDHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair. I, first, just want to say that I really appreciate you guys coming before us and giving such clear and passionate and well informed presentations to us, not just this meeting, but in the past. You know I enjoy hearing from you and I'm glad that this message can be stated so clearly.

My question back to you is, whether or not you are aware of efforts in the region by 12 Federally recognized tribes that have also forwarded petition to the Secretary of Agriculture, the Homelands Conservation Petition that has gone forward, and whether or not you've had any interaction with that group and how you see your proposal aligning with some of the actions that are in that petition, if you're aware of it.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

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MS. CULP: Thank you, Cathy. That's a really good question. I will admit I am in possession of that document and I did start reading it but, you know, in the flurry of getting our proposal and everything in line, I have not revisited it. But I definitely got the feeling of where everybody is going, we're all in the same (In Tlingit) so to speak. And what we are proposing is that the foundation of the subsistence issue be converted to food sovereignty and get rid of the word, subsistence. And look towards the indigenous knowledge as the foundation to build on food sovereignty. And this food sovereignty also includes what is also known as food security. So this is a broad thinking that ones who live off the land and depend on the natural resources and also see the changes coming to global warming and how it's affecting our foods, this is the best information to provide for village tribal governments who will provide to Tlingit and Haida Central Council, who could conceivably pick up management of the food sovereignty program and then from there work with the Federal Subsistence Board and, of course, SERAC in gaining our system, which is the same system we're looking at right now with the proposals and the administration would go through the tribal sources rather than the Federal Subsistence Board. The Federal Subsistence Board would be a supportive.

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## CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Followup Cathy.

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MS. NEEDHAM: Yeah, Mr. Chair, thank you. And thank you for that Ms. Culp. Also in your testimony you mentioned, you know, the work on the marine mammals, which is obviously part of the Marine Mammal Protection Act, and in work that this Council has previously done with respect to sea otters, we understand that that takes an Act of Congress in order to be able to make those changes to implements and effects. I know that this Council struggled with a lot of that. We tried to get the language -- or tried to work on language changes when I first got on the Council and it became a pretty difficult endeavor and still, to this day, has not been changed. And so I'm wondering if that's your understanding that it would take an Act of Congress to potentially implement that aspect of it and, if so, if you've had, you know, prediscussions with the Alaska Delegation where something

like that might get sponsored for that Act of Congress.

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And I ask that, I know, because I feel like it could potentially be a road block and the petition that is going to the Department of Agriculture is more under the APA rulemaking process, which might, you know, finding ways to merge your efforts into that might be a more streamlined way that would, you know, not take an Act of Congress to do but that's just -- I might not have a right handle on that, but I was wondering if you could address that aspect of it.

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## Thank you.

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MS. CULP: Yes, that's a really good question because we've had to grapple with that as well. But, you know, the Federal  $\operatorname{\mathsf{--}}$  the Fish and Wildlife Service has that so-called Subsistence Division and the interpretation has been -- their gut interpretation has been against the Alaska Natives. Now, this is my example of how the Marine Mammal Protection Act is misinterpreted, and with laws like this, we're not asking for new laws of Congress, and throughout the process, yes, there will have to be some changes, but right now the interpretation of the five Federal agencies that make up the Federal Subsistence Board, they haven't been a damn bit of good for us. I'm sorry to say it but, you know, we need focus on food sovereignty. I think that the subsistence thing has gotten too out of hand, it's been dissipated so much by so many and not us. So the thought here is not to put the tribes into -- we're not trying to dictate certain anything to the tribes but it's just merely a concept proposal saying that the interpretation of these laws such as the Marine Mammal Protection Act, ANILCA Title VIII start with the basis of indigenous knowledge, outlook and concept, not from Washington, D.C., or the industry's lobbyists or commercial this, that and the other thing, but start from the grassroots of who these laws are for and it's land based. You see the current subsistence setup covers -- especially with the State of Alaska involved, that's got to stop, you know, I mean the State of Alaska is out of compliance with ANILCA Title VIII, that should bounce them right out of this picture because they have totally (indiscernible). Now, if we get into disregarding the State's Fish and Game regions and reapply the 12 Alaska Native regions, corporation regions, now this brings us into working face to face with our very own Alaska

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Native Corporations, our land surrounds our villages, they're still Alaska Native lands even though it's private property, it's still in our tool box and Sealaska's very friendly to our proposal.

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It's going to take cooperation of everybody and start scraping the old notion of subsistence and thinking of a system that's broken and let's fix it. And let's build a foundation from indigenous knowledge because our intelligence is what is going to save this. Everyone recognizes it. It's not a threat to anybody. But it's unutilized and untapped on resources we want to bring to the table. Just get to thinking from indigenous point of view, those laws will fall into shape as far as interpretation, won't be so confusing.

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And, yes, we will run into some snags where it will take adjusting from Congress but I think it will be adjusting and it won't be major.

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Did that answer your question?

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MS. NEEDHAM: Yeah -- Mr. Chair -thank you, Ms. Culp. I really appreciate, again, the time that you take to put these thoughts together. I think you're very well versed and educated in this and obviously very passionate about the idea. I just want to let you know as well as other Council members know that, I ask my questions because I'm trying to find, you know, another group has come before us to ask for our support in a petition that they submitted, and I just am hoping that we can find ways that these efforts, which are becoming more and more -- I don't want to say emergent, we've been working on this ever since I've been on the Council and longer, probably since Patty Phillips started on this Council, been working on this type of thing and this movement that is happening very loudly right now. And I support food security and food sovereignty and I definitely support indigenous management of local resources. I am an Alaska Native person. Much of my career is spent working in the realm of collecting information that can be used for resource management decisions and so I'm only trying to ask a little bit of the hard questions in terms of how can we merge or move forward together as one so that we don't have conflicting efforts out there and that we can take a path forward that will potentially be successful.

So I just wanted to assure you that I am not -- I'm hearing you, I guess, is what I'm saying and I appreciate that you're bringing this to us and I feel like you're giving us a lot of information and tools and venues and I hope that all of the efforts in Southeast can move together in this direction.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Cathy. Anybody else on the Council have a question or a comment for Wanda or Rebekah.

## (No comments)

MS. CULP: I would like to add something, this is Wanda. I would like to thank you Cathy for your suggestion in joining that coalition of tribes and, you know, we're trying to build a concept and hope everyone supports it, at least the concept and build it into what the tribe is thinking and wanting to So, yes, we'll definitely finish reading that document. I'll make a point of it and then make contact with -- we have been -- conference with President Peterson and his land managers, it was real productive. We started communication. But you know there's -- we need follow through. You know, we're just in the village trying to make things happen and the support you folks are bringing forward is really going to help us bend the earlobes of other people, of other groups as well. Kake Tribal, we've been in contact with them. And other groups too. SEAC. So the meetings have been real receptive but like Cathy said we need to organize within ourselves to somehow have a meeting of the minds and get all of our good thoughts and ideas moving.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Wanda. Maybe I'd like to jump in here, as the Chair. What I am wondering is in this effort, I'm assuming that the tribes are going to take the main lead in kind of trying to bring this about and I am wondering how the Council can best be involved. I know there'd be a lot of interest, you know, on the Council in this issue and how it all comes about and, of course, the Council will be instrumental in implementing anything that would happen as a result of your effort, so I don't know, Wanda, if you've got any special requests of the Council or how we might become best involved, I guess

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1 in this effort. Have you thought about that?

MS. CULP: Oh, yes, certainly have. You know we're talking about redesigning an existing program. Moving it from a word called subsistence into realm called food sovereignty and this puts us right to the grassroots of the whole issue and from the ground up we start building a governing system of resolutions. Like what you folks are doing already but redesigning it through the villages, the village tribal governments. It's their responsibility. Many village tribal governments have been excluded for so long in the process they're now thinking they're corporation, and you've got corporations thinking they're village governments so, you know, within our own self we have to straighten things out. And we understand that. But this is an opportunity with this new politics going on here in our favor that we can literally bring forward concepts like this, buy into it, you folks can pick up what you can and support us to the other communities saying, here's a good idea, let's see what we all can do about this, this is what we're doing.

We made it to D.C., more than once. And using our authority as mothers and women within a cultural respect where we had never been invited to the table before and it's a cultural way for us to be as involved as the men are. So this is the balance we're seeking. And yes it starts grassroots, it starts in our own villages. We have to start looking at each other again, not as corporate, you know, not as village but as people that have the same interests and common goals. And I think that once we start doing that all the others should fall into shape because we have to gain each others trust again. And this is a concept that should bring us together, hopefully not divide us.

But it all has to do with food, we all have to eat. And it all comes from our lands, the ones we're talking to right now, all of these folks listening, we depend on the land, and the clean water, air, and we're seeking a way to bring the intelligence of the indigenous people forward and hopefully this intertribal government incorporated into the Southeast Tongass communities, the remote communities and then bringing it forward all the way to D.C., so that we truly have our say. It's a way for us to truly participate and have our say.

 And it brings people not so fragmented -- everything is so fragmented, if you look at your own web page on there it gives me a brain cramp trying to figure it out. I think we're all in the same boat. So we're proposing, let's back off -- let's drop the words that are causing all this confusion and use the laws as they're intended and change the dialogue that fits the purpose.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: So, thank you, Wanda. And the way I'm looking at things now, your WECAN group specifically mentions climate action and that has been a topic that has become -- starting to come to the forefront here before the Council and that incorporates just a whole lot of the issues that you've talked about this afternoon. You know, food security and who manages the resource and, you know, what has happened in the past, management in the past has gotten to this situation where people are worried right now. They don't like what they see happening. There's some warning signs out there related to -- climate change is kind of a result of a lot of (indiscernible) uses of the resource and mismanagement over a very long period of time, obviously. It's just kind of a manifestation of what you were talking about of how we've so industrialized our uses of the resource that we've brought this upon ourselves and now is the time. And I know Rebekah is a younger person and we must think about them and their future and where are we going from here, and it's a turning point. It has to be a turning point. And the proposals that you're talking about I think will start moving us in the right direction if they can be brought about. And I think we'll -- we have to rely, I think, on indigenous voices to be a strong advocate for change here and that's what you're doing.

I think you do have to take the lead.

You know speaking for the Council we can certainly be involved in any way we can but I really do think it's important, as you pointed out, for the tribes to take the lead on this. I don't see anybody else doing it. There's not a lot of people doing it. There's a lot of opposition to where you're trying to go.

So moving forward, as I said, you have to take the lead, I believe, and the Council would like

to be involved, I believe, so we have to try and make that happen. And, you know, just from the Council's point on this I proposed at the start of the meeting that we form some kind of a subcommittee or a working group of the Council and maybe some representatives of your group that can start to work together and at least keep informed of, you know, what's happening so that when we do have meetings of the Council, that working group or subcommittee can, you know, bring that information back to the Council. Be involved in, you know, some of the work that you do as well and that way the Council can stay involved in this and try and push it forward. You know as our role, as an advisory council, you know, eventually some of this obviously will come before us to be approved, presented, whatever, that's part of our charter is to deal with management policies. So it is certainly in our mandate here.

So I don't know if you have any thoughts along those lines about working with the Council in that way?

MS. CULP: Thank you. I really appreciate it, of course we would and we would be very happy to. And it's a good idea that we have a mechanism in which to report to you folks because as we move forward we would like you folks to know have we connected with those 12, is Central Council involved, is Sealaska involved, is village corporations, even our village councils, especially our village councils involved so, yes, I feel like we have a lot we could report on to you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay.

 $\,$  MS. CULP: We'd appreciate doing that, thank you for asking.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: I think that's something we may attempt here. I know previous meetings, you know, the Council really wanted to take some concrete moves towards trying to address, you know, all the issues related to climate change and that definitely fits in with the whole food security issue that you're addressing. So I think it would be a good combined focus for the Council to be involved in both of those issues and it could all happen in one venue as I see it.

0482 1 MS. CULP: Nice. 2 3 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: So maybe I better 4 let some other Council members weigh in here if they 5 have anything to add or say. 6 7 (No comments) 8 9 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Anybody 10 else on the Council have any questions they want to 11 12 13 MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair, this is Ian. 14 15 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Ian, go ahead. 16 17 MR. JOHNSON: I don't necessarily have 18 a question other than just to back up what you're 19 saying. I mean I already feel like -- certainly I know 20 the Council has a history of this. It's certainly --21 climate change, in particular, is important here in 22 Hoonah, and Wanda and Rebekah, you know, help continue 23 to underline that. We've already talked about proposal 24 effects, weather effects this season and those have 25 been reflected in the change in proposals that have 26 been done in Pelican and, yeah, I think as we go 27 forward trying to think, not reactively, but more 28 proactively to how we expect climate change to impact 29 our food sovereignty, at this time known as 30 subsistence, is just, yeah, of utmost importance. 31 32 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Ian. I 33 agree. We're reacting. We need to be proactive. And 34 I think we've got a lot of issues before us that we 35 can't regulate our way out of. We have to dig deeper 36 and start looking at policies and things like that. So 37 it's -- we're not going to regulate our way out of 38 this, it's going to take more effort than that. 39 40 Anybody else. 41 42 MR. WRIGHT: Yeah, this is Frank. 43 44 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Frank. 45 46 MR. WRIGHT: Yeah, you know, everything 47 that this RAC does is based on taking care of the 48 environment and taking care of all the animal life so

that it would benefit not only the rural communities

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 but make sure that everything we do keeps indigenous wildlife around for generations. You know, when you think about it, we are doing what we can right now to take care of the environment, as every living animal, every living fish and everything is part of the ecosystem and that's something we have to take care of. You know people in this world are not listening to what's going on in this world and, you know, even though we may be just a little drop in the bucket we still make a drop in the bucket difference.

You know, I always think about, you know, one time I was in Juneau and I was talking to this guy from the south and I said, you know, this oil business, you know, everybody's been in a car and they've ran out of fuel, this earth is going to -eventually the tank is going to get empty so we need to -- really need to keep on people and figuring out alternatives without destroying this planet. I hate to say this but I'm probably not going to be here to watch it if we don't -- here to watch it and see it with my grandkids and my grandkids kids', you know, and then they have to face what's going on in this world right now. It's already happening and no one even -- no one even seems to care, you know, it's kind of like, you know, I think about it and wonder about my grandkids and my daughter and everybody that has to deal with this issue that the rich people don't care about what's going on in this world. You know, it's -- like I said, what we've seen in this little community, Hoonah, there's so many changes that, you know, in my 70-some years and it's amazing what's changed around here. You know I enjoyed it when I was a kid, I was able to play marbles in the middle of the road, now there's so many cars in this town you can't even walk across the road without getting run over.

You know, the people that speak up, you know, that speak up, those are the people that makes us feel good, and the RAC, the Council that, you know, there is someone that is saying something and it may not reach the big people but it's a comfort to our ears, you know.

Heather Bauscher has brought these young children to our RAC meeting and then those young children think about what they live in and what's happening in this world, it gives you hope. So I commend her for having kids show their interest in what

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    we're doing.

We recognize that holding face to face Council meetings in rural communities across Alaska is preferable for engaging the public most effectively. The Federal Subsistence Management Program is fully committed to resuming in-person Council meetings across 7 Alaska as soon as it is possible to do so safely. 9 OSM Staff changes. 10 11 Since your last Council meeting, the 12 following Staffing changes have occurred. 13 14 I, Doctor Brent Vickers, started at OSM 15 as OSM Anthropology Chief in December. 16 17 Greg Risdahl moved over to U.S. Forest 18 Service in January to become their Subsistence Program 19 Leader, and will be the Forest Service representative 20 at the InterAgency Staff Committee. 21 We are grateful to have experienced 22 23 people on the ISC that will remain with the Program as 24 advisors to their Board member. 25 26 George Pappas is currently the acting 27 OSM Fisheries Division Chief, in addition to his normal job as liaison to the State Wildlife and Fisheries 28 29 Programs. 30 31 Katya Wessels, Council Coordinator, is 32 currently acting as OSM Policy Coordinator. Katya was 33 just selected as Council Coordination Division Chief 34 and will be starting mid-March. 35 36 Steve Fadden came to us from the U.S. 37 Fish and Wildlife Refuges to be the acting OSM Wildlife 38 Division Chief. 39 40 Sabrina Schmidt has served as one of 41 the clerks at OSM, she took a promotion with the 42 military in January. 43 44 Council appointments and applications. 45 46 Annual Council appointment process is 47 complex and takes about 15 months to complete. It 48 begins in September each year when the Federal

Subsistence Board announces the open application period

49

1 for Council membership. During a six month application period the Program conducts an extensive statewide 2 recruitment and effort. The Program distributes 4 approximately 2,000 applications throughout Alaska via 5 mail and email to individuals, agencies and organizations. Additionally the Program conducts 6 7 wide-range outreach through a variety of media outlets including, but not limited to newspaper, radio, TV, 8 9 internet, FaceBook and public conferences. Last year, 10 2020, the effort resulted in 74 applications to fill 62 11 vacated or expiring seats. On January the 15th, 2021, 12 OSM received copies of the Regional Advisory Council 13 appointment letters signed by the former Secretary of 14 Interior. At that time we received full appointments 15 only for four Councils. Kodiak/Aleutians, Bristol Bay, 16 Northwest Arctic and the Seward Peninsula, and partial 17 appointments for three Councils, Eastern Interior, 18 North Slope and Southcentral. Three Councils, Western 19 Interior, Yukon Kuskokwim Delta and Southeast Alaska 20 did not receive any appointments in January 2021. I'm 21 glad to announce that on Monday, March 8th, we received copies of an additional 27 appointment letters with 22 23 full seats of appointments on Western Interior, Yukon 24 Kuskokwim Delta, Southeast Alaska, Eastern Interior, 25 North Slope and Southcentral. At this time there are 26 only eight vacant seats on all Councils.

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The application period for this year's 2021 Regional Advisory Council appointments was open until March 12th. The application deadline was extended. By December 2nd of this year we are going to have 35 open seats for appointment or reappointment, and as of today we have very few applications to fill these seats. We are encouraging Council members, whose terms will expire in December 2021 to reapply. Your Council Coordinator should have contacted already if your membership expires this coming December. We also encourage other Alaskans to apply for Council membership. Serving on a Regional Advisory Councils is the best way to proactively participate in the Federal Subsistence Management regulatory process to help sustain your traditional way of life. Your participation on the Regional Advisory Councils allows for better time regulations to be developed that satisfy the needs of the users in the region, and, at the same time, assure the continued viability of fish and wildlife populations. Please let your coordinator know if you want to reapply or apply or would like to nominate someone so that they can get you to the

application form. Also please encourage knowledgeable users in your communities to apply as well.

Over the past two years we have been reminding Council members about change in requirements for IDs at airports. This has been postponed until October 1st, 2021. Note that all Council members will need to make sure that they have the required RealID for travel next fall. If you don't have the correct ID, please make sure that you get it before the fall 2021 Council meeting cycle.

Lawsuit from the State of Alaska.

On August 10th, 2020, the State of Alaska filed a lawsuit against the Federal Subsistence Board after it adopted emergency special action WSA19-This allowed the village of Kake to engage in a community harvest of two antlered moose and five male Sitka black-tailed deer. Also included in the lawsuit was a temporary special action WSA20-3 which closed Federal public lands in Units 13A and 13B to non-Federally-qualified moose and caribou hunters. As part of the lawsuit the State asked the court to issue two preliminary injunctions. One to prevent the Unit 13 closure from taking effect and another vacating the Kake hunt and prohibiting the Board from allowing any additional emergency hunts related to the impacts of Covid19. On September the 18th the U.S. District Court denied the State's request for a preliminary injunction on the Unit 13 closure. The court found that, because the State has not demonstrated either a likelihood of success or serious questions on the merits of its claims, the court need not consider the remaining elements of the preliminary injunction analysis.

Two months later on November the 18th, the Court also denied the State's motion for a preliminary injunction on the Kake hunt after Judge Gleason concluded that the State had not demonstrated a likelihood of success on the merits, raising serious questions on the merits of its claim, or demonstrated any likelihood of irreparable harm.

First of all I'd just like to answer the question about the extension for the applications, they closed -- I know it was a little bit misleading -- confusing what I said, but they did close on March 12th, and it was confusing because I was reading from a statement that was written before and just had to change it, so they are currently closed.

As for your next question, DeAnna, you might be a little bit better prepared to answer those. I have some idea but I really don't want to mis -- make the wrong statement. So DeAnna, can you answer more appropriately.

MS. PERRY: Sure, I'd be happy to Brent. I would like to let folks know that the information that Brent mentioned about applications is still relevant. In fact I usually keep a tickler list throughout the year for those folks who have expressed interest in Council membership. So although this cycle application period has closed, if you have someone that you'd like to nominate or someone who's interest through the summer, and into the fall, please don't hesitate to reach out to me and I can make sure that when the applications are printed and available, that I send those out to those interested.

So for the appointments. I believe everybody is quite encouraged that we'll get back on our regular schedule and that we can expect appointments to be made that first week in December, usually by December 2nd. That's not a promise but I think there's definitely some hope there that we will be able to kind of get back to our regular schedule.

I would like to revisit the Board meeting. As Cathy had mentioned, she participated in the Board meeting earlier and one of the strong comments from almost all Council revolved around the appointments, the lateness and the non-appointments for three of the Councils. The folks at OSM did explore some possible solutions to that and we'll get to that a little bit more with the charter but Cathy had kind of offered up a solution and wanted to know if it would be possible to perhaps put something in the charter that would allow us to have a revolving time so that, for instance, if you are currently seated on the Council, December 7th rolls around and your term expired December 2nd, so your appointment letter had expired,

as to serve an appointment until new appointments. And I can, again, clarify more when we get to the charter discussion. But OSM did explore that, it is possible, and I can let you know that up to date I believe all the other Councils have chose to put that wording in their charters. So this Council will be looking at their charter a little bit later and if they choose to do that that might be a solution to, if appointments are not received in the normal time, that perhaps we would be able to have that continuing term.

But we were seeking applications for projects that address priority information needs that you developed at your last Council meeting and that gather information to manage and improve subsistence fisheries in Federal public waters in Alaska. The Monitoring Program is also directed at supporting meaningful involvement in fisheries by Alaska Native and rural organizations and promoting collaborations among Federal, State, Alaska Native and local organizations. For the 2022 funding cycle it is anticipated there will be \$2.25 million available in the first year of new projects. Anyone wanting to apply, particularly for the next cycle, can find information about the program on the Federal Subsistence Management Program web page or by visiting www.grants.gov.

After the funding opportunity window closed, applications will be reviewed by the Technical Review Committee. The results of that review will be presented to you at your next meeting.

MR. REAM: Hi, Mr. Chair and members of the Council. For the record this is Joshua Ream. I am the Regional Subsistence Program Manager for the National Park Service.

I don't have a whole lot to report but, you know, I'll start with Staff at the regional office. Luckily my program is now fully Staffed for the four positions that we have on our work chart. We're excited to be able to support more of the statewide National Park Service program as well as the Federal Subsistence Management Program as a whole.

Don Striker, who is the Superintendent of Denali National Park and Preserve remains the Acting Alaska Regional Director. Timing for the permanent selection of this position is yet again delayed and this time it's due to the change in the Administration. So we expect that it may be the end of April or May before we get any word on the filling of that position.

Maija Lukin, who is the Superintendent of Western Arctic Parkland has accepted a position as the Park Service's Native Liaison based in Anchorage. She will transition to that new position by the end of this month. In fact, I think she's already in there. And she'll be moving to Anchorage, I believe in May. So this was a position that was vacated maybe two years ago and we're really, really excited to have it.

Joel Hard is our Deputy Regional Director and has been for some time but he is retiring at the end of this month.

And Deb Cooper is an Associate Regional Director for resources and she's retiring this year, we suspect, in June. The Subsistence Program is situated within her directorate and we are sorry to see her go but we wish her the best in retirement and we have lots of gratitude for all that she has done to support the Subsistence Team within the Park Service over the years.

The Park Service Subsistence Program has been working really closely recently with the Alaska Native Science and Engineering Program. We're excited to have entered a contract, a cooperative

agreement with them to bring on student interns in the summer. We might be able to add more but we currently have at least three students each year for the next three years. It's been successful in getting ANSEP to expand their internship focus to include projects that are more anthropological or interdisciplinary.

Our agency is also working with ANSEP and our Washington office and I believe now, the Department, regionwide, throughout Alaska, to potentially make ANSEP a direct hiring authority and this would allow ANSEP to hire our summer interns even though they would be working for NPS, and if the student successfully completes the internship including a minimum number of work hours and they graduate from their degree program, they'd then be eligible for noncompetitive hiring status for up to two years following their graduation. It's a great opportunity for the Park Service to hire ANSEP students permanently and to retain excellent talent when it's identified.

And then just a brief note on the Partners for Fisheries Monitoring Program, statewide, the Park Service is lacking quite a bit of fisheries biology capacity that we once had and to help address this need and to further develop collaborations our regional office program, Subsistence Program, is looking at ways that we can be better engaged with the Partners Program so we're hoping to utilize the expertise of partners like the Ahtna InterTribal Resource Commission, Bristol Bay Native Association, Yakutat Tlingit Tribe, Native Village of Eyak and others to coordinate research and joint funding proposals in Park associated lands. And we'll have more on that hopefully in the fall.

SUMINSKI: Good afternoon, Mr. 21 Chair and Council members. Terry Suminski with Forest 22 Service. I just wanted to point out in your 23 supplemental material the summary of Federal 24 subsistence special actions, it starts at 12A. And 25 that is a list of all the in-season actions that were 26 taken in Southeast in calendar year 2020. I won't read 27 through them all. I think maybe the new Council members 28 are very familiar with those, they should be, 29 hopefully, if did our job right. 30 31 The only thing that -- the action we've 32 taken since then and you've heard a little bit about 33 that already is the limited closure to eulachon in District 1 which allows limited fishing in the Unuk 34 35 River. 36 37 So without going into a lot of detail, 38 I'd just open it up for questions if anybody has any. 39 40 Thank you. 41 42 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thanks, 43 Terry. Any questions on special actions from the 44 Council. 45 46 (No comments) 47 48 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. We all have 49 the list to refer to there. Okay, DeAnna, you

0501 mentioned that Melinda Hernandez Burke had a report for us but she was busy, I don't know if she's available 2 vet. 4 5 MS. PERRY: I think she is almost 6 there. I know that she gave me kind of the five minute 7 warning just a couple of minutes ago so I think it's probably at any time. We had originally thought that we might also be able to hear from Ray Paddock with 10 Central Council letting us know some information on the 11 Unuk and Taku Transboundary monitoring that's going on 12 and he is, unfortunately, in a meeting right now but I 13 believe that he has passed along information to Melinda 14 so that's another thing that Melinda can speak to the 15 Council about as well. 16 17 So I don't know if maybe we want to 18 take care of one of our action items while we're 19 waiting for Ms. Hernandez Burke to be available. 20 21 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Probably will. 22 Were there any other Native organizations that wanted 23 to report to us at this meeting. I don't see anyone on 24 the list here. 25 26 MS. PERRY: Not that I'm aware of other 27 than Ms. Culp and the WECAN group, and Rebekah Sawers. 28 29 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. I just 30 wanted to check if there were any others. Okay, let's, 31 while we're waiting for Melinda to finish up let's go 32 to the Council charter review. That was brought up by 33 Mr. Vickers. We had a little discussion on that with 34 you and Cathy so why don't we take care of that charter 35 review. And I know the information about the charter 36 is in our Council book, I believe it starts on Page 64. 37 38 MR. VICKERS: Yes, hello, Mr. Chair and 39 Council members. This is Brent Vickers again. 40 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yes, hello, Brent. 41 42

MR. VICKERS: Let me review this charter review script for you.

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CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay.

MR. VICKERS: Under the Federal Advisory Committee Act your Council charter is reviewed

every two years. Before the charter is renewed the Council has a right to review it and discuss any changes that they would like to propose to the Federal Subsistence Board. The Board then reviews proposed changes and if the Board agrees the request for proposed changes is forwarded to the Secretary of Interior.

A lot of language in your charter is actually required by the Federal Advisory Committee Act and is implemented policy so you can't change that language. The changes that you can request are the changes to the name of your Council, or to the number of members on your Council, but you will need to have reasonable justification for it. You can also request an addition of language that specifies a desired membership balance that, if achieved, would allow the members of the Council to represent the entire region. For example, a few years ago the Kodiak Aleutian Council requested and was granted approval to geographically rebalance the membership to have four members from the Kodiak Archipelago, three from the Alaska Peninsula and three from the 30 Aleutian Pribilof Islands. Because that region is so spread out the Council wanted -- that having a broader geographic representation is a value for them. During the last charter review the Western Interior Alaska Council also added similar language to their charter.

Additionally, delays to Council appointments experienced over the last few years, the Council also may want to consider requesting adding a provision to its charter that allows a member to serve after the expiration of his or term until a successor is appointed. This is what is called a carryover term that will come into play if the appointment letters are late. Rather than the members' term expiring and the Council having an empty seat on that Council that member could continue to serve until an appointment letter comes in. If the Council is satisfied with all charter provisions and requests no changes then the Council can just simply vote to forward the charter to the Board.

As a reminder, during the last charter review of 2019 the Secretaries approved new language suggested by the Councils that their charters — that alternate members may be appointed to the Councils to fill vacancies if they occur out of cycle. An

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alternate member must be approved and appointed by the
    Secretary before attending the meeting as a
    representative. The term for an appointed alternative
    member will be the same as the term for the member
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    whose vacancy is being filled. However, in order to
    have an alternates there needs to be a sufficient
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 7
    number of applications in your region. Alternates are
    appointed as members only if a seat was vacated because
 9
    of a member passing, resigning or moving out of the
10
    region.

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Council members, guests, tribes, public, this is Melinda Hernandez Burke, Tribal Relations Specialist for the Forest Service here in the Alaska region. Apologies I was not available a little bit ago when my name was called. I had to step out for a consultation. But happy to be invited to give a bit of a report today.

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I heard from Bob Schroeder, he really wanted to hear about some plans to include tribes in some management structures and I have something for you that I'm happy to share and some of you might have already heard about it. I was hoping to be joined by Ray Paddock from Central Council today but he's not available right here at this time.

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But wanted to share a bit about the Tlingit and Haida and the U.S. Forest Service signing an Indigenous Guardians Network Partnership back in September. It was really exciting to see this coming to fruition. I first learned about the concept of the Indigenous Guardians when I attended a workshop that Cathy and many other folks were at looking at the model in Hyda Gwaii and the relationship that the First Peoples there have with the Federal government and the way that their management structure is allowed for, that indigenous on the ground knowledge to be incorporated into decisionmaking. So was really happy when the Regional Forester was approached with a proposal by Central Council and some other partners in this network and we were tasked with making it happen. So fast forward a couple months in September there was an MOU signed and one of the really cool things about this agreement is that one of the broad topic areas is subsistence. One of the others is adaptation planning. The other is shared stewardship and then heritage as well. So we're still at the very, very beginning stages of this partnership which Tlingit and Haida has just signed a Staff member who's going to be working full-time on supporting their training, growing the program. We have a charter to build, we have a steering committee to build. So just really excited on how this is going to play out with communities, with tribes, applying ecological knowledge and sustainable ways of living into monitoring projects, restoration of the Forest.

great articles about the partnership with DeAnna, to give out to everybody via email and I'll put a link here in the chat as well.

So the Indigenous Guardians 5 Network is operating under Tlingit and Haida and 6 they've asked the Forest Service to come in as a 7 partner, a signatory partner, and I know the bigger partnership network includes FFP, SpruceRoot, a lot of 8 other partners out there. But I think where it 9 10 parallels and has some tie-in to the Subsistence 11 Program is that one of the broad focus area topics is 12 subsistence, so we look forward to really exploring 13 that and building it. I can't tell you exactly what it 14 looks like right now but I think this network is going 15 to be something exciting just to bring some of these 16 efforts together and really the focus is incorporating 17 indigenous knowledge and traditional ecological 18 knowledge into management practices. So broad -- kind 19 of broad goals and we look forward to building that 20 with a lot of folks at the table. 21 22 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. 23 24 MR. HOWARD: A followup, Mr. Chair. 25 26 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead. 27 28 MR. HOWARD: Well, Mr. Chairman, you 29 heard earlier there's 229 Federally-recognized tribes. 30 Angoon Community Association has always stated that the 31 Tlingit and Haida is like the regional corporation but 32 they're a regional tribe. I asked the guestion for a 33 reason and the reason is is that it seems like, I don't 34 know if they're trying to take over the role of the 35 Southeast Regional Advisory Council, I could see it 36 happening that way watching how they've taken over 37 other programs and basically -- they took a lot of 38 programs out of Angoon that we can no longer get back. 39 40 I'll give you an example. 41 42 The housing authority, we have no say 43 over what happens with our funds anymore. And, yeah, thank you so 18 much look forward to future opportunities to engage. 19 20 Gunalcheesh. 21 22 Thank you. 23 24 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, 25 Melinda. Okay, are we ready to go to the annual 26 report. 27 28 MS. PERRY: Thank you, Mr. Chair. So 29 on Page 69 -- for the record this is DeAnna Perry. On 30 Page 69 of your meeting book you'll see the details 31 about the purpose of the annual report and then on Page 32 71 you'll see the draft of this Council's 2020 annual 33 report. And I know most folks have had an opportunity 34 to look at that, should we take a few moments to look 35 that over one last time before we dive in, Mr. Chair. 36 37 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, everybody 38 has to familiarize themselves with it. Yeah, while 39 we're doing that I was just -- maybe like to bring it to the Council's attention. We have a rather lengthy 40 41 item on Council vacancies, some of that has been 42 resolved, maybe the underlying issue is still there. 43 don't know if we wanted to change anything in that item 44 but it bears looking at. 45 46 MS. PERRY: And, Mr. Chair, I did 47 assume that I would need to update that with numbers 48 and I think I have in there may expand this line, which 49 depending on the appointments so anything that's not

0519 factually correct, that can change. 2 3 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. 4 5 MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy. 6 7 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy. 8 9 MS. NEEDHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair. 10 When I think about annual reports I think about this 11 particular annual report being reflective of issues 12 that we worked on during 2020 and that was definitely a 13 very highlighted issue with a lot of discussion and, 14 you know, this is our opportunity to show the Board 15 where we spend our time and what types of things that 16 we work on so other than, you know, the updates that 17 Ms. Perry needs to provide I don't necessarily feel 18 like we need to cut it out completely. I know that 19 they know that it's a concern because it was reported 20 on at length by all of the Councils at the Federal 21 Subsistence Board meeting but it is also part of this 22 longer term established public record from the actions 23 of this Council. 24 25 So I just thought I would provide that 26 feedback on that particular piece. 27 28 Thank you, Mr. Chair. 29 30 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, thank you, 31 Cathy. 32 33 MS. PERRY: Mr. Chair, following up on 34 what Cathy just mentioned. You will note that on Page 74, just before paragraph four, that last paragraph on 36 Council vacancies, we are asking the Board to take some 37 action by sending a letter. So I just wanted to bring 38 that to your attention. I had not expected to take any 39 of that out, again, I just expected to change the 40 numbers to accurately reflect our new appointments but 41 the rest of that would all stay in. 42 43 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, I think it's 44 worth, you know, for the record informing the incoming 45 Secretaries that, you know, we recognize the importance 46 of having fully seated Councils just for the record, so 47 to speak, you know, we have this history behind us of

how it's been. As you said, DeAnna, just making sure,

you know, that the numbers which, you know, at the time

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0520 you wrote this were valid and current might have changed some but we could change that. 2 3 4 So as the Council looks through this, 5 just ask if anybody picks up anything else that they 6 want to see amended. And I guess we still have an 7 opportunity to add something if we'd like, correct, 8 DeAnna. 9 10 MS. PERRY: Yes, we can do that, Mr. 11 Chair. 12 13 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. 14 15 MS. PERRY: This is where you finalize 16 and approve so we can certainly add something. 17 18 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. 19 20 (Pause) 21 22 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: And while we're on 23 this topic in relation to bullet point No. 6, the 24 status of fish and wildlife resources in Southeast. I 25 do want to thank our Fish and Wildlife Staff for 26 putting together what I think is a really good report 27 that we could pass on to the Secretaries. It's a 28 report that they presented to us on harvest of fish and 29 wildlife at the beginning of the meeting. I think 30 they've got a really good concise way of presenting the 31 data and I like the way they kind of set it up with the 32 averages -- a couple different averages over 10 year 33 periods, kind of make for a good quick comparison and I 34 think that information will be helpful to the Board and 35 the Secretaries to get a good synopsis of how our 36 harvests are going here in the region. So I want to 37 thank them for that, it's good work. 38 39 MR. HOWARD: Mr. Chairman, this is 40 Albert. 41 42 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Albert. 43 44 MR. HOWARD: Do we want to add concerns 45 about the newly created kelp fishery and the lack of 46 information on how it will affect subsistence users and 47 resources around the kelp farms that are being created. 48 It's part of, you mentioned earlier, being proactive

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instead of reactive.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. Albert. So I guess here's my feeling about that. Now, you know, the kelp farms they would be taking place out of the jurisdiction of what the Subsistence Board has, you know, in salt water, and, you know, issues like that do affect subsistence users but there isn't really anything that the Board or the Secretaries, it's not really in their jurisdiction. But there's ways to deal with that and I think it's something we have to consider here as we're moving forward.

A lot of the issues that we may see that, and have in the past, have gone into annual reports, I think can be better addressed with letters that are sent to the agencies that actually, you know, have jurisdiction. And we have done that. I mean we've sent letters to the State Department of Environmental Conservation and obviously Department of Fish and Game, I think, on issues. So if that's an important issue we can send letters from the Council to those agencies, you know, expressing our concerns. But I don't think the annual report is really the right way to go about that.

So if we want to keep that on the radar for our letter writing correspondence policy, I think that would be a better way to address it.

MR. HOWARD: Well, Mr. Chairman, you're correct, we don't have jurisdiction but what I learned through the ETJ process is, in fact, if you exercise the extraterritorial jurisdiction and ask the Federal government to come in and look at an area because we felt that the State wasn't properly managing the area. Within that petition the Federal government came back and said, well, you have three years to fix this or you're going to lose jurisdiction of that area to the Federal government. So even though they have jurisdiction it can be temporary.

I think we need to put this on the front burner if there's concerns of subsistence users in that area.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Thank you, Albert. I'm not the, you know, final say over what we do or not, I was just offering up a suggestion there.

I don't know if there's anyone else or Staff, you know, that has any kind of input on this.

MR. CASIPIT: Hey, this is Cal Casipit. I just wanted to chime in a little bit in here about extraterritorial jurisdiction. I may be overstepping my bounds because I'm not Staff anymore. But petitions for extraterritorial jurisdiction are really complicated but basically what that is is where the Secretary reaches out his own jurisdiction to change or influence an activity happening outside his or her jurisdiction that affects subsistence resources -- or affects the resources occurring on areas under his or her jurisdiction. So we have to be careful about when we use the terms ETJ and what it means and what the Secretary can do or not do under ETJ, it's a really complicated legalistic thing. And, yeah, I just wanted to bring that out.

 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Cal. Yeah, I guess my understanding of that is that is the process. It is intended to take jurisdiction over something that would affect uses on Federal public lands such as, you know, in the Angoon petition, the impacts were out in the saltwater but the -- I should say the problem was out in the saltwater, the management jurisdiction, but the impacts were happening at the stream which is Kanalku on Federal public lands. So different situation I guess with kelp aquaculture.

MR. HOWARD: Mr. Chair. That was just a demonstration of the fact that, yeah, they do have jurisdiction but it's not set in stone. That wasn't intended to say, well, let's try to exercise -- that wasn't my intention by my comment, it was just to demonstrate that my understanding of jurisdiction and how that works. So when you create a new fishery and it takes food off of subsistence users table that's affecting their table. So I was just trying to offer an idea on remaining proactive and getting a grasp on what's happening before it happens and before it does affect someone in that area and they no longer can get their halibut there or whatever else they get there.

But we don't have to do this, it's just a suggestion.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. And it is a good suggestion, Albert, and I'm thinking about it

here a little more, you know, before any of these kelp operations get started there's all kinds of permitting that must have to happen. I don't know how much but I'm sure there's permitting that has to happen and there's agencies that have to issue those permits. could be Army Corps of Engineers, State Department of Environmental of Conservation, I am not sure what all the jurisdictions are. But I think it is well worth our while to send letters to the entities that are involved in the permitting just to let them know that, you know, subsistence users have a concern here so before they issue any permits they have to consider that and investigate it and bring it back to the public and all that process. And if an operation gets permitted and goes into operation and does start having impacts, you know, despite our efforts to prevent that from happening, well, then other action has to be taken. But, you know, until something actually happens I mean there is a process, we can be involved in that process and I think that's the place to start before we start voicing our concerns to the Secretary of Agriculture. I mean that's just kind of my opinion.

MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy.

MS. NEEDHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chair. You know, I think this is an important and emerging potential issue within our region and I respect that Mr. Howard brought it back to the table for the annual report but I feel like it's possibly something that I personally would want more information and discussion on before I would include it in an annual report because we've only really just heard it in this year which is 2021, and the annual report should reflect all the work that we did in 2020.

So maybe one thing to do besides just keeping it on our radar is to request that for our next Council meeting that maybe we get somebody to come before us to talk to us about how we could be involved in the permitting process to have that -- you know, how members could get involved in that process, whether it's us making comments or individual communities so we could learn a little bit more about how we could get involved at the forefront of some kelp farm going in. And maybe that's a good -- not put it in the annual report but keep the issue alive and make sure that

information is coming back to us so that we can start building a public record on it.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, thank you for that suggestion, Cathy. I think it's a good one. And, you know, also aquaculture, that's something that requires a lot of permits and what not, but, I know, Albert, you've also expressed concerns about new fisheries that are developed and not a lot of consideration go into the impacts it might have on other users. That's kind of a separate issue. It's not something you can just point to a specific permit, application on but it's a topic that can be discussed for sure. Something to put on our agenda for the future, I think.

MR. HOWARD: So this whole concept is already to the permitting process and this is the first time we're discussing it. So before it even reached the permitting process why wasn't there a process before that. So now anybody can apply for a permit and go through the process without us even knowing about it until now. Why wasn't this part of any of the agency reports saying, hey, this is is what's coming. This is what's coming and how is it going to affect your community if one of these pops up in your community. Why wasn't that part of any of the agencies reports to this Council so we could have acted on it before it got to the point where an individual now can go apply for a permit to put one of these in an area and, yeah, I can talk this to death but I don't always agree with the permitting process because I've dealt with it on so many different level in so many different areas but you don't get the full story on what created one of these farms was done to the environment. And now I have more concerns because I've got more questions now than answers.

So if one of these pops up in Angoon, I don't know how it's going to impact Angoon because the people that are allowing this to happen probably don't

0525 know themselves, and that's the problem with creating a new fishery is it's never fully looked at on the impact that it'll have, whether it's positive or negative, it's always revenue -- is more important than anything 5 else. And if it's going to create jobs and revenue, 6 well, we'll deal with everything else later. 7 8 Thank you, Mr. Chair. 9 10 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, you've 11 raised some really good questions Albert. Definitely something that needs further exploring. I think we 12 13

should keep that in mind for a topic for our future 14 meetings here, or, yeah, I don't know the best way to 15 address it but, yeah, it's definitely a topic of

16 concern.

    herring fishery that was more conservative. We didn't
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 want to stop the fishery but it seemed like it got to the point where we couldn't -- all our arguments were falling on deaf ears. Even though the tribe basically won two parts of the lawsuit to where they got to consult with the tribe. One of those things was part of the test fishery and the notice, and they didn't consult with the tribe again. So I guess they're going to go to court.

So basically I just want to say that the State of Alaska would not listen to our people here in Sitka.

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. Thank you, Harvey. Yeah, we'll just ask DeAnna to kind of take notes here of what's being said and the language that needs to be added to the letter she'll work from her notes and transcripts and what not.

So anybody else have language they want to suggest putting in the letter.

MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, this is Cathy.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy.

MS. NEEDHAM: I don't have specific language necessarily. But if we could point towards the fact that this Council has spent a number of years receiving reports regarding herring stocks and was involved in other potential efforts in the region for having herring listed, or recognized as forage fish and trying to take other protective methods. We've also -even when Mr. Kitka was not on our  $\operatorname{--}$  reappointed for our Council he still came before us to give updates of this petition, the Kaagwaantaan's intent to submit this petition forward. So I think we understand that other avenues and efforts had been tried before it got to an ETJ petition for finding ways to put protection on herring in Sitka Sound. And, you know, an ETJ petition for herring in Sitka has been put before the Secretary, even in the past before I was on the Council, even, and so it's a longstanding issue and continues to be a concern and it really feels like this might be one of the last tools in the tool box that the community is able to potentially use in order to get the attention that this conservation on herring in Sitka Sound has.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: So I have some things that we could add to the letter. I think it should point out that the -- I think the Council supports the transition away from old growth harvest to a second growth harvest, however, the Council also has concerns that in the harvest of the second growth, or the young growth, should be done in a manner that has the least adverse impacts on subsistence uses. I see the potential for logging in the young growth as having almost as much impact as taking the old growth in the long-term. I think it needs to be done in a very limited manner and done with techniques that allow for habitat restoration, I think would be the key term. There's opportunities to allow for habitat restoration when they conduct young growth harvest.

MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair, this is Ian.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Yeah, go ahead,

Ian.

MR. JOHNSON: Yeah, just adding to that, that they're conscious of, you know, we want to be thinking proactively again about climate change so thinking about snow intercepts and other factors that, you know, basically these stands are going to develop to the point where they are probably functioning at least partially as an old growth stand in regards to intercept and other factors affecting deer. So we don't want, you know, we need to be thinking about winter deer habitat on top of spring habitat, summer habitat when creating young growth opportunities.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Right. So essentially, and I don't know if this needs to be put in the letter, we don't want to see clear-cutting techniques in the second growth harvest. There's opportunities -- I mean right now it's very poor habitat and there are opportunities to, you know, do some thinning and improve habitat but if you were to go about and start clear-cutting in the second growth stands that would not be beneficial at all so there are opportunities to improve the stands, take out some wood and not do further damage to the habitat. It's still

going to take a long time for the habitat to recover regardless but we certainly don't want to do more damage.

MR. CASIPIT: Mr. Chair, this is Cal Casipit. I want -- I wholeheartedly support the focus of -- I think the way we want to state it is just say, from a cultural prescriptions and young growth -- young growth managed stands should focus on deer habitat restoration. I think if we say that we would kind of keep away -- get away from a semi-cultural prescription where they're just looking at tree production. If we actually specify that we expect a semi-cultural prescriptions to restore wildlife habitat -- or restore deer habitat, I think we're ahead to say that.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Cal. I think that's a good succinct way of saying what I was trying to say. So good wording.

MR. JOHNSON: Mr. Chair, this is Ian.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Ian.

MR. JOHNSON: I apologize, but I need to get off for actually another phone call at 5:00 of a meeting I have to lead so I appreciate everything that's happened in the last few days. I've got brain kill by now. I guess in terms of letters, I would like to bring -- once the vote is done on this Forest Service one, bring back to your attention, we did mention a potential letter around the regulatory process in kelp farming. And I know you alluded to Forest management and other subcommittees and I would just like to volunteer myself to participate in any of the subcommittee that might be formed later in this call.

And, again, I really appreciate everyone's time and thank you again, Staff, and everyone else.

So I think what we need to do here is, and, DeAnna, you have to weigh in 9 10 on this but I think we have to identify several Council 11 members who will get together with -- probably have to 12 rely on Melinda Hernandez Burke to help us maybe make 13 these connections but we have to find the right people 14 to work together on this issue and I know the women 15 from the Womens Earth and Climate Action Network would 16 probably be involved but there could be others, we have 17 to identify. But at some point we'll have to set up 18 some meetings, some get togethers of some kind and 19 start coordinating efforts. And this may be mainly a 20 way for the Council to stay in touch with what's 21 happening because I think these other groups are going 22 to -- the tribes, in particular, are going to have to 23 be pushing on this but I think if we just wait to get 24 reports during our meetings we're probably not going to 25 be able to keep up, there's going to be too much going 26 on. So if we have a group that can stay up on all of 27 this while it's happening I think that would be very 28 helpful and I know, you know, some of the people who 29 are likely to be on that group will probably have some 30 pretty good input into what happens as well.

make a motion, that they make it either for a working
group or a subcommittee, they are two different things
and we shouldn't use those terms interchangeably.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. I kind of recognized that and I guess the question is, you know, what would facilitate this best. Would it be a working group or a subcommittee, and along those lines I would ask can a working group include non-Council members, like if we want to have members of the WECAN or tribes on our working group or is the working group only Council members?

Maybe as things get rolling, maybe it would become evident that we might actually want to form a subcommittee, but for right now we're just looking for coordination and being able to share information and keep abreast of what's happening and it certainly sounds like a working group

DOUVILLE: Okay. Thanks, good luck 29 on that one, you know. 30 31 (Laughter) 32 33 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Anybody 34 else want to comment. 35 36 MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, I have an 37 additional comment. 38 39 CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Go ahead, Cathy. 40 41 MS. NEEDHAM: I find it interesting 42 that during a pandemic the Board of Game, you know, 43 altered their schedule and shifted it to another 44 meeting and that this proposal came in without -- and 45 passed without much in the way of opportunity for 46 commenting on proposals during any kind of cycle. You 47 know we just heard about this proposal, it was just 48 submitted to the Board of Game not too long ago, it 49 didn't go through the process so I can't imagine that

there was a lot of opportunity for other subsistence users in the region to call in to make comment on the proposal, especially the amendments that were to the proposal. We got a copy of Proposal 149 and it didn't have all those extra complicated factors into it and obviously we also did not support the reporting of harvest within seven days of take and the additional reduction of time. Like on the Federal side we -trappers seal their hides within 30 days of the end of the season I believe it was which was an action that the Federal Board took the last wildlife cycle. So it does seem like it's going to be quite a complicated situation to work through during this next wildlife cycle but I really question the way the Department handled this one -- or the Department and the Board of Game handled this one. Because on such a controversial and hot topic, it feels like it was snuck in under the radar.

Thank you, Mr. Chair.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Thank you, Cathy. Did you just want to state that for the record or do you want a letter of any kind to follow that up or you want that on the record.

MS. NEEDHAM: Mr. Chair, I just wanted to state it for the record. It's something that we could be thinking about while we wait for the Department of Fish and Game to submit a companion proposal on the Federal side. I think it's -- I think I will remember in six months when we reconvene to bring forward when we deliberate on any kind of Federal companion proposal.

BEMIS: I'd like to make a comment about something that's -- a program that's going on in Yakutat that was just brought to my attention and has to do with fish tagging and let's see, what was it, fish tagging and tracking of king salmon, if that's okay, I'd like to give just a brief -- I don't have the names of the individuals but I got the program that's representing them.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Larry, just so I can keep things straight in my mind. DeAnna, am I correct that we concluded all of our business?

MS. PERRY: Yes, Mr. Chair, everything on the agenda, all the action items. If you'd like to close out the meeting with a round robin with all Council members that would be great.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay, we'll probably do that. But go ahead, Larry, give us your update.

MR. BEMIS: Okay. Just here about a week before the season closed two individuals came from two different universities. One from the UofA and one, I think, from Fairbanks, I'm not positive. Okay. funding was funded with one individual through NOAA and the other one was from the Department -- the U.S. Navy, through DOD. Now I'm not sure if this is done before but they hired a local charter boat captain to take them out for a given number of days and they sports catched the king salmon and they've got a tagging program going. One is 20 backpacks that will be inserted on the back of the salmon for 10 days to see his depth, his travel, distance, where he's at, and this is in the Yakutat Bay in different sectors, all species. Now, the backpacks are probably being put on very good size salmon so they can be able to survive packing this thing around, okay.

The second one is they insert some kind of electronic device, I'm not positive how or what, but they sedate the fish and keep it alive and give it a micro surgery and then place a micro chip of sort that takes temperature and depth and a few other things.

Now, the surprising thing is, is one individual was doing this and had a grant through NOAA and the guy from another university had funding through DOT and U.S. Navy asked to join in. So I think that they're both working on the same projects and they're doing this every single day in different parts of the bay, out in the ocean, in the islands, shakers to full size king salmon and everything they catch that they can release is put back in the water with some kind of device on it. And didn't have -- they just said we'll name it tagging and tracking program for king salmon in the Yakutat -- in the Pacific Ocean -- or Gulf of Alaska.

## That's all I have.

CHAIRMAN HERNANDEZ: Okay. Sounds pretty interesting. So let's -- before I adjourn the meeting just want to give anybody on the Council an opportunity if they have any final words.

 MR. DOUVILLE: It's been my pleasure to be here and I'm glad we have a full functioning Council. I was quite worried about having only five members and having a meeting. So I'm glad that that resolved. And other than that I'm just taken aback by the Board of Game's action. It's going to take me awhile to absorb that and come to grips with it.
