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**2016 Yukon River Summer Salmon Fishery News Release # 8  
District 4 Subsistence Fishing Schedule  
Districts Affected: Upper Yukon Area**

The preseason outlook for Chinook salmon is for a run size similar to last year of 130,000 to 175,000 fish. A precautionary management approach is being taken to restrict the harvest of Chinook salmon until inseason assessment indicates that escapement goals will be met and a reduced subsistence harvest can be supported. The department closed subsistence gillnet fishing in the Northern Portion of the Coastal District and Districts 1–3 to protect the early trickle and the first pulse of Chinook salmon.

The preseason outlook for the 2016 summer chum salmon run is projected to be 1.3 to 1.8 million fish and is anticipated to provide for escapement, a normal subsistence harvest, and a commercially harvestable surplus range of 450,000 to 950,000 summer chum.

Assessment information from the Lower Yukon Test Fishery program indicates that summer chum salmon have been moving into the river, but in low numbers over the past week. Chinook salmon have been counted in sufficient numbers by the sonar project near Pilot Station to warrant closing Subdistrict 4-A to subsistence salmon fishing with gillnets when Chinook salmon are expected to enter the district. However, given the presence of summer chum salmon, the dip net and live-release fish wheel subsistence fishery in Subdistrict 4-A will open 24 hours after the gillnet closure. Fishermen should be aware that this subsistence selective gear opening is beginning early in the season to help fishermen prepare, but catches may be low until summer chum numbers increase significantly. Fishermen can call **(866) 479-7387** for recorded Lower Yukon Test Fishery catch information beginning June 1.

The department encourages subsistence fishermen to report their harvest information as well as their encounter rates with Chinook salmon while fishing for summer chum. These reports are useful for managing the early portion of the summer season.

### **Management Actions**

**Subdistrict 4-A Lower** (from  $\frac{3}{4}$  miles downstream of Old Paradise Village upstream to Stink Creek, which includes the mainstem Yukon River communities of Anvik and Grayling):

Subsistence salmon fishing is currently open 24 hours a day, seven days per week and fishermen may use fish wheels and 7.5-inch or smaller mesh gillnets.

Effective 6:00 p.m. Monday, June 6, subsistence salmon fishing with gillnets is closed to protect Chinook salmon.

Effective 6:00 p.m. Tuesday, June 7, subsistence fishing will reopen with dip nets and live-release fish wheels for 24 hours a day, seven days per week to target summer chum salmon.

**Subdistrict 4-A Upper** (from Stink Creek upstream to Cone Point, which includes the mainstem Yukon River communities of Kaltag, Nulato, and Koyukuk):

Subsistence salmon fishing is currently open 24 hours a day, seven days per week and fishermen may use fish wheels and 7.5-inch or smaller mesh gillnets.

Effective 6:00 p.m. Friday, June 10, subsistence salmon fishing with gillnets is closed to protect Chinook salmon.

Effective 6:00 p.m. Saturday, June 11, subsistence fishing will reopen with dip nets and live-release fish wheels for 24 hours a day, seven days per week to target summer chum salmon.

Fishermen are required to immediately release Chinook salmon alive from dip nets and fish wheels. Fishermen are also reminded they must closely attend the fish wheel and Chinook salmon must be immediately released alive from the livebox. The requirement to release Chinook salmon alive will be strictly enforced. Great care must be taken to assure Chinook salmon are released quickly and unharmed so that they can swim the long distance upriver and spawn successfully. Fishermen are also strongly encouraged to avoid fishing where Chinook salmon may be encountered.

During subsistence salmon fishing closures in the Yukon Area, 4-inch or smaller mesh gillnets of 60 feet or shorter length may be used for non-salmon species. All salmon caught in 4-inch gillnets may be retained, but fishermen are reminded not to target salmon as this gear is intended for non-salmon species.

**Subdistricts 4-B and 4-C** (from Cone Point to Illinois Creek, which includes the mainstem Yukon River communities of Galena and Ruby):

Subsistence fishing is currently open 24 hours a day, seven days per week and fishermen may use fish wheels or gillnets (set net only) with a mesh size of 7.5 inches or less. Fishermen should be prepared for management actions that will close subsistence salmon fishing when Chinook salmon are expected to arrive in the subdistrict.

**Koyukuk River:** Subsistence fishing is currently open 24 hours a day, seven days per week and fishermen may use gillnets with mesh size of 7.5 inches or less. Fishermen should be prepared for management actions that will close subsistence salmon fishing when the first pulse of Chinook salmon is expected to be migrating into the Koyukuk River.
