Dear Mr. Stayman:

Thank you for you letter requesting my views on the impact of the Compacts of Free Association on the State of Hawaii. We welcome the members of our community who have joined us from the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM), the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau, but the nation as a whole must share responsibility for the obligations the United States undertook when it entered into these treaties.

As you know, the U.S. Census Bureau's 1997 census of Micronesians shows that 4,815 persons have come to Hawaii using the entry rights granted them by the Compacts of Free Association, which freed them of the immigration restrictions applicable to persons from other countries. Those persons have had about 544 children since arriving, for a total population impact of 5,349. Hawaii has more than four times the number of Compact migrants the Department of Interior estimated in its January 1997 report. The 1997 census shows that there are more Compact migrants in Hawaii than in either Guam or the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI).

We appreciate the efforts of the Department of Interior (DOI) and the U.S. Census Bureau in conducting the 1997 census of Micronesians in Hawaii. The Compacts have a far-reaching impact on the State because of the large number of Compacts migrants who live near the poverty level, experience language barriers, and need medical, financial, and social services.

The 1997 census shows a startling rate of poverty among Compact migrants. Almost 40% of all Compact migrants live below the poverty level. About 25% of Compact migrants live below 50% of the poverty level. Most Compact migrants are not doing much better than this very poor group. About 52% live below 185% of the poverty level. These statistics probably understate Compact migrants' poverty because the poverty level is calculated for the nation as a whole, and

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does not take Hawaii's high cost of living into consideration. Because of the State's steadily decreasing tax revenues from our prolonged economic recession, we are struggling with a projected budget shortfall of \$95 million for the fiscal year 1999. We simply cannot absorb the extra costs of providing the social services and medical and financial assistance needed by such poor immigrants.

The 1997 census found that only about 20% of all Compact migrants speak English at home, and that about 60% speak another language at home more frequently than English. This has many ramifications for our educational system and for our ability to respond to community health problems and deliver necessary medical and social services.

We spent over \$6 million last year to fund the enrollment of about 1,100 Compact migrants or their children in our public schools. This places a large burden on our public school system, even without taking into consideration the instructional challenges posed by the language difficulties of many such children. About 85% of these children are enrolled in our state-funded language program for students with limited English skills. We simply do not have the resources for the necessary bilingual educational programs in our schools. Language difficulties among some students detract from the quality of the classroom educational experience for all. From 1988 to 1997, Hawaii spent over \$29 million educating Compact migrants or their children in our public schools (Attachment A).

We estimate that the State paid medical providers over \$3.3 million last year for medical services to Compact migrants (Attachment B). We also spent about \$434,000 to fight infectious diseases such as Hansen's disease (leprosy), tuberculosis, and Hepatitis B among Compact migrants (Attachment C). Because of the grave public health risks such infectious diseases create, we have made the detection, prevention, and treatment of these diseases a top priority.

As a result of an outbreak of Hansen's disease (leprosy) among Compact migrants, we screened 237 people and discovered 11 cases. The Hansen's Disease Community Program and the Public Health Nursing Program provided screening, laboratory work, medications, and follow up, including home visits. Because of substantial cultural differences in the perception of health care among Compact migrants, the program has had to drastically alter how Hansen's disease services are delivered. Because of these cultural differences and language difficulties, the program will continue to need translators and culturally-sensitive outreach workers. Several churches are helping our outreach efforts. Because of the very high prevalence of Hansen's disease in this population, we must continue to hold general skin screening clinics instead of relying on the less manpower-intensive contact referral process. The State has held in-service training in the detection of Hansen's disease for most state public health nurses and is planning other training for primary care physicians and primary care clinics that serve this population.

The State spent about \$134,000 last year on the detection, prevention, and treatment of

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tuberculosis and Hepatitis B in Compact migrants (Attachment C). We expect our Hepatitis B costs to quadruple in 1998 due to increased outreach efforts. Of course, our Public Health Nursing Program and other publicly funded medical programs serve many Compacts migrants who have medical problems unrelated to or in addition to these three infectious diseases.

In addition to these medical expenditures, the State spent about \$849,000 last year providing temporary financial assistance to needy or disabled Compact migrants or their children (Attachment B).

The Compacts also have had an impact on our criminal justice system. In 1985, the year before the Compacts went into effect, citizens of the Marshall Islands, FSM, and Palau were arrested for 57 offenses, and 18 individuals were convicted of a total of 28 offenses. In 1997, such citizens were arrested for 419 offenses, and 94 individuals were convicted of a total of 146 offenses (Attachment D). It costs the State \$75 a day to incarcerate an inmate. Although we have not compiled complete statistics on how many Compact migrants were incarcerated, we do know that our costs have been substantial even without including other law enforcement costs such as those relating to the arrest, prosecution, trial, and probationary supervision of offenders. We conservatively estimate that the State has spent over \$1.2 million since 1988 to incarcerate Compact migrants, and we spent about \$205,000 in 1997 alone (Attachment E).

The 1997 Census shows that the rate at which Compact migrants are coming to Hawaii is steadily increasing. We expect this trend to continue in part because of the dramatic decrease in Compact funds payable to the governments of the FSM and Marshall Islands. Under the terms of the Compacts with the FSM and the Marshall Islands, U.S. funding drops sharply after each five-year period after 1986. There are no agreements for Compact funding after the year 2001.

The Compact of Free Association Act of 1985 states, "[i]n approving the Compact, it is not the intent of the Congress to cause any adverse consequences for the United States territories and commonwealths or the State of Hawaii." 48 U.S.C. § 1904(e)(1). The Act contains Congress' commitment to redress adverse consequences. It states:

(4) Commitment of Congress to Redress Adverse Consequences. The Congress hereby declares that, if any adverse consequences to the United States territories and commonwealths or the State of Hawaii result from implementation of the Compact of Free Association, the Congress will act sympathetically and expeditiously to redress those adverse consequences.

48 U.S.C. § 1904(e)(4). Section 1904(e)(6) authorizes appropriations to reimburse the State of Hawaii for costs resulting from Compact immigration for fiscal years after 1985.

The Compacts were designed to enhance the United States' national security by giving the

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United States strategic access to and the right to exclude adversaries from vast stretches of the Pacific and accompanying airspace. It is only fair that the nation as a whole share the burdens as well as the benefits that flow from these treaties. It is time for Congress to honor its commitment to redress adverse consequences to the State and to reimburse us for the last twelve years of Compact impact costs.

Thank you for transmitting these views to Congress.
