To Host Eagle Presentation

ANADARKO, OKLAHOMA: The Southern Plains Indian Museum, administered by the Indian Arts and Crafts Board, U.S. Department of the Interior, will host an eagle presentation for all ages on March 11, 2016, from 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM.

Guest speakers William “Bill” Voelker and Troy, of the Comanche Nation Ethno – Ornithological Initiative program, will discuss the cultural significance of the eagle for American Indian peoples along with state and federal laws that protect birds of prey. As co-founders of the program, Bill and Troy have four decades of experience in raptor research, public education, and conservation. During the question and answer portion of the program Troy will present special guest Nuepi (which means “Tornado” in Comanche), a captive-bred Golden Eagle.
