# FEDERAL SUBSISTENCE SEASON FOR GOATS CLOSED IN A PORTION OF UNIT 5A

**EXPLANATION:** This Special Action closes the 2018 Federal subsistence mountain goat season in a portion of Unit 5A. The closed area begins on the west shore of Harlequin Lake and the western edge of Yakutat Glacier; then west of Harlequin Lake and Yakutat Glacier to Yakutat Bay and Disenchantment Bay; and south of Russell and Nunatak Fjords. The closure is effective through 12/31/2018. The Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) has previously established a closure for the same area (Emergency Order 01-02-18).

Authority has been delegated by the Federal Subsistence Board to the Yakutat District Ranger to close the season for goats in Unit 5A.

#### **JUSTIFICATION:**

Aerial surveys conducted between 2006 and 2016 in this area indicate a significant decline in goat numbers. The following are survey results by year: 2006-122 goats, 2007-66 goats, 2008-57 goats, 2009-48 goats, 2010-6 and 12 goats, respectively, 2011-58 goats, and 2016-19. The consistently low number of goats detected suggests the areas' goat population remains depressed. The federal subsistence season has remained open in recent years in order to allow to continue subsistence harvest opportunities. No goats had been harvested in this area in recent years; however, in October 2018, one female was harvested by a subsistence user. Any additional harvest of goats in this area could have long term negative effects on the health and recovery of this population. State and federal managers intend to survey the population in fall of 2019 in order to obtain updated information; however, given the best available data and the recent harvest of a female, managers consider it necessary to close the season for conservation concerns.
